## \$5.4 million contract let on Boardman coal plant

Portland General Electric company has awarded two contracts to Hoffman Construction Co., Portland, for foundation and concrete work at the utility's Boardman Coal Plant. One contract is for approximately \$5.4 million and the other for about \$2.7 million.

Under the larger contract,

Hoffman will install the foundations for the turbine and boiler buildings and the chimney. In addition, Hoffman will do the concrete work for the intake and outlet structures to the reservoir and the pollution control equipment. Other items in the contract include some excavation, base and elevated concrete flooring and installation of storm and

sanitary sewers.

The second contract is for foundation and concrete work for the coal unloading structures in the coal handling yard. It includes some grading work and steel erection.

Work on both contracts is expected to begin this month. Major portion of the work will be done during 1977 with some work continuing into 1978.

Construction of the 530,000 kilowatt coal-fired plant is about 10 per cent complete. The Boardman plant is located 11 miles southwest of Boardman, Ore., and is scheduled to go into operation in July 1980 at a cost of about \$500 million.
