**Attic**

- install at least six inches of insulation
- try an attic fan to reduce air conditioning load

**Bedroom**

- install storm windows
- turn off unused lights
- turn up room air conditioner thermostat

**Bathroom**

- fix leaky faucets
- take showers instead of tub baths

**Kitchen**

- use covered pans that fit heating element
- plan several oven dishes for a meal—don't peek
- fill dishwasher to capacity

**Living room**

- turn down thermostat in winter; turn it up in summer for central air conditioning
- caulk and weatherstrip windows and doors

**Basement**

- set hot water temperature no higher than 120°, insulate pipes and tank
- service furnace once a year; check filters regularly

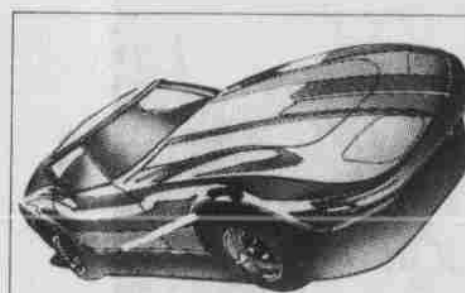
