"Pests in the garden can be controlled by using compatible plants with the emphasis on herbs," stated Delpha Jones in her report to the Ione Garden Club at its meeting at the home of Delta Huber on May 11. Some interesting facts that she related were that basil repels flies and mosquitoes which are the bane of tomato growers; marigolds and nasturtiums make war against the beetles and nematodes; nasturtiums also work against aphids and squash bugs; the herb dead nettle and horseradish repel potato bugs; the herb chervil keeps worms and maggots away and hyssop deters the cabbage moth. Dill must not be planted with carrots and peas and glads are not compatible.

During the business meeting, it was reported that we had a very successful District No. 10 Blue Mountain meeting in Ione. The Plant Sale on May 5 was a satisfying experience, with many in the community getting plants for their gardens. The Junior committee reported that there were 24 entries in the contest for the use of recyclables for toys and table favors from the second, fifth and sixth grades of Ione Elementary School. Council receives annexation bid

A letter from Union Pacific R.R. was read at the Irrigon City Council meeting on May 10, indicating the railroad tracks would be removed within the city. No definite time was set for the action to be taken.

Doug Cannon and Tom Elms requested an annexation of 200 acres into the city for orderly development of the area. The acreage lays south of and adjacent to Calif. Ave. It will be necessary to hold a public hearing on the annexation before a decision can be reached, according to City Manager David Moon.

The council discussed a request for purchase of the city-owned service station. The building was previously advertised for sale, with no bids submitted. The station will again be advertised for sale.

Mr. and Mrs. Ted Wilson requested a liquor license for the Pivot Point to permit serving beer with meals. The rooms where the County offices were formerly housed would be developed into a dining area. The request was granted.

Dave McClellan stated his desire to build 6 homes on 2 acres presently zoned in 1 acre tracts, on 13th St. Five would be built immediately and the sixth would be built where his mobile home is located now. He was referred to the planning commission for consideration and was informed he would need to go through the subdivision process.

Royal Hovinghoff presented a protest to the council's recommendation to the County Planning Commission's plan to rezone the area surrounding the city to 5 acre (Farm) instead of the present 1 acre (Farm Residential). The land was zoned Farm Residential from Farm some 3 years ago.

In other business, Marshall Gene Cain requested that more gas be allotted for patrol. This will be considered at a later council meeting.

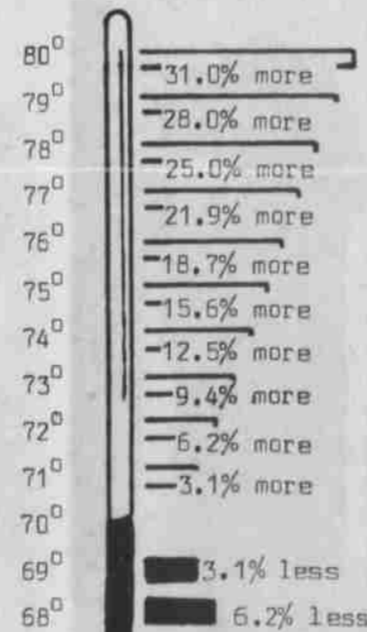
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BMCC sights students for mechanics

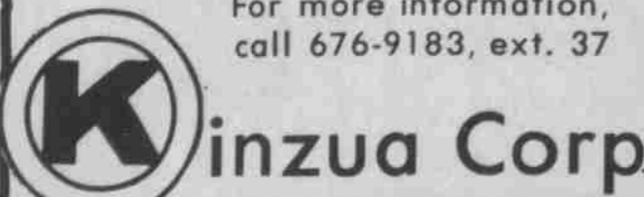
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
