Driscoll, Clinker united

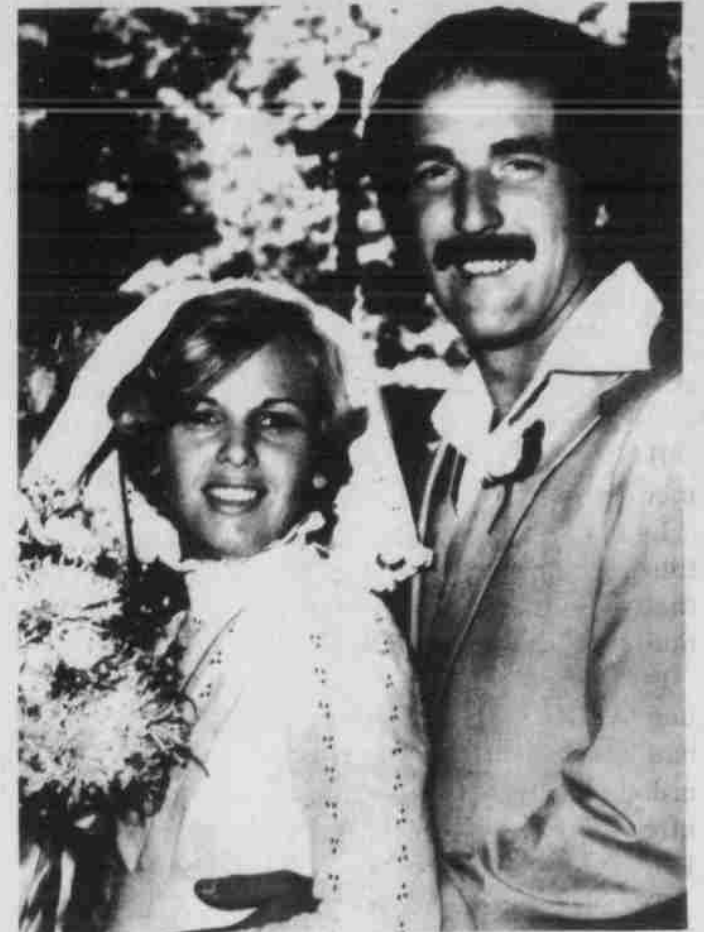

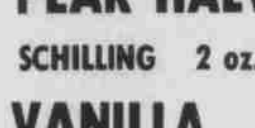

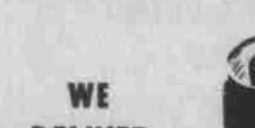
