

At state tourney High rollin' keglers

Heppner women bowlers placed well in both individual and team competition during the Oregon State Women's Bowling Tournament held in Pendleton from March 5 through July 3.

Several of the categories had more than 1,500 entries from across the state competing for the prize money and awards.

First place winners for the Heppner ladies included Billie Doherty, who recorded a 1,518 pin total to take the overall honors in the Class C competition, and Barbara Strahm, who topped the field in the Class D singles event. Diane Taylor and Billie Doherty teamed for the high doubles game award in Class C with a 414 pin total while Barbara Strahm rolled the high singles game of 232 in the D category.
