# Survey shows economic choices Planning fees adopted

Final summaries of the July 14 "Wages, Welfare or What?" Town Hall meeting showed that by a 5-1 margin, Heppner residents attending the meeting believe economic security should depend on employment rather than income maintenance.

A somewhat contradictory conclusion showed that 50 per cent of those surveyed were willing to pay higher taxes to guarantee a minimum standard of living.

The Heppner meeting was one of 55 meetings held in 35 communities throughout the state in which more than 3,000 people expressed their views

on public assistance and economic security. According to the Oregon State Division of the American Association of University Women, co-sponsors of the Town Halls, the "request for citizen input was an unqualified success."

The Heppner summary also showed that to reduce economic insecurity, a majority of the respondents believe government programs should develop jobs rather than concentrate on training programs or work requirements. More than 50 per cent

indicated a guaranteed minimum income should be over \$6,000, and 21 per cent thought the income should be in the \$8,000-12,000 range.

An updated fee schedule was adopted Wednesday by the court for the Morrow County Planning Commission. It covers comprehensive plan or zoning map amendments, conditional use and variance requests, zoning permits, map work, appeals and land partitions. The schedule reflects an increase—the amount depending on the request—over the flat rate of \$25 formerly charged for most land use hearings.

## County Court Action

The hiring of Ralph Marlatt as courthouse maintenance custodian was the first business enacted by Morrow County Court on Wednesday, Sept. 22. Marlatt will take over

maintenance responsibilities for the building and grounds on Oct. 1.

In other action, billing responsibilities for the ambulance recently purchased by the county for the Boardman-

Irrigon area was turned over to the administrator of Pioneer Memorial Hospital. Tri-County Health formerly handled billing for the ambulance.
