High school drop-outs will have an added opportunity to earn a High School Equivalency Certificate. The GED test center located in the Counseling Center at Blue Mountain Community College will remain open until 9:00 p.m. Tuesday evenings.

The center is always open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. The Tuesday evening time was

Host families sought

Host families are needed for young people from Mexico (11 - 16 years of age) who are participating in the exchange program, "Intercambio" or International Student Exchange Program.

The students live with an American family practicing English and learning our way

of life and culture. The El Salvadorians arrive November 17 and return home January 20. From Nicaragua and Costa Rica the students arrive December 1 and return home February 10.

Students are sponsored by their own families or civic groups in their own countries.

Cost includes air fare, health insurance, supervision and administration. Host families meet students at the airport and contribute room, board and lots of love. American and Canadian youth can join the program to Central America and Mexico for about eight weeks in summer.

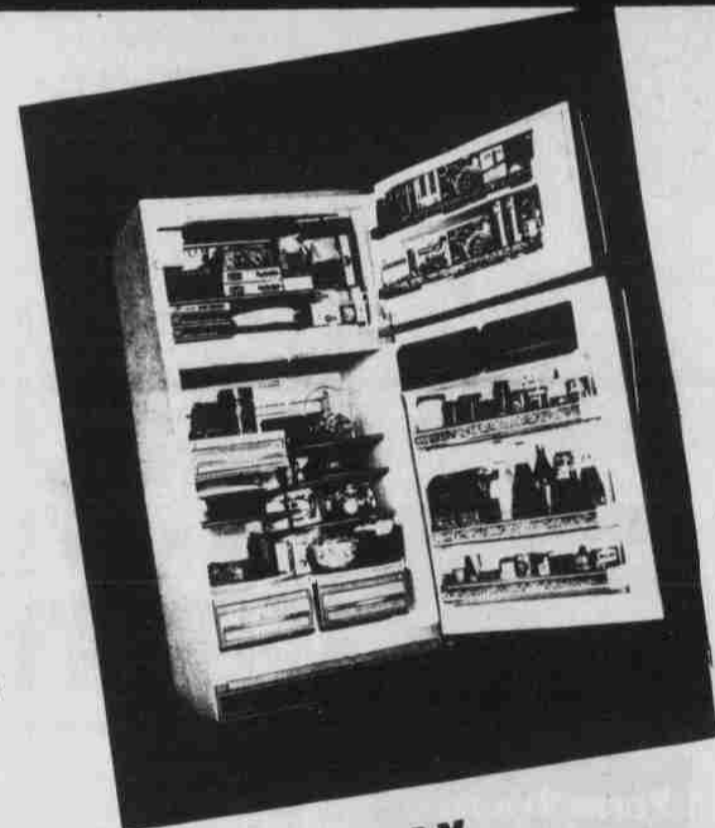

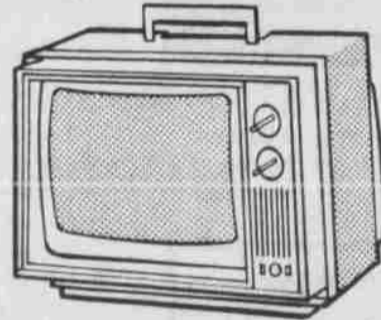

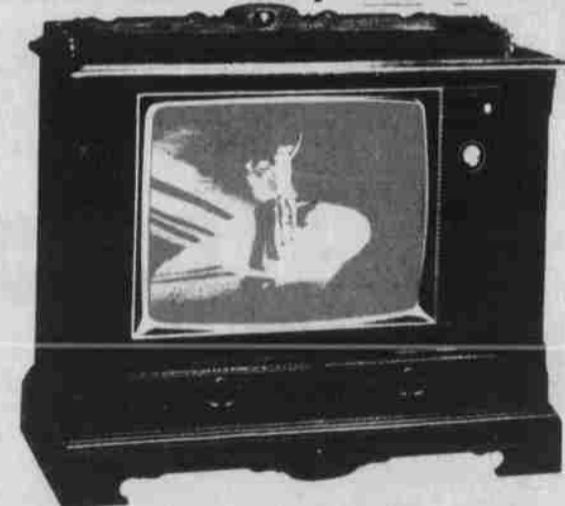
