Two local men suffered a harrowing experience in late October while fishing for crab in the waters of Cooks Inlet off the coast of Alaska.

Gayl and Albert Phillips, brothers whose home is in Irrigon, were working aboard the 97 ft. fishing boat, Adventure, on Monday, Oct. 24, when a severe storm came up and waves swamped the boat and sank it. The skipper of the boat and the two Phillips put off in a life raft and spent 2½ hours in the sea with swells up to a

height of 30 feet. They were rescued by a Coast Guard helicopter as the craft was making its last circle run in the darkness of the of the shortening Alaska day.

They called their mother, Mrs. Virginia Phillips of Irrigon, and flew home soon after. Having experienced enough adventure in fishing for the season, the men expect to remain in Irrigon and construct some homes on property they own on Division Street.
