

Forest receipts recieved

Morrow County received \$354,098.53 this week as its share of revenues from the U.S. Forest Service for the sale and use of national forest products and services during fiscal year 1977. A first estimate had slated \$369,000 for the county but was later reduced to a \$296,578 estimate. Last year the county received only about \$140,000. A record \$118 million has been distributed to 31 Oregon counties and 27 Washington counties, with Oregon sharing \$89,774,346.95 of that amount.

The money returned to the state, and in turn the counties, represents 25 per cent of the money collected from the sale of timber and from grazing, recreation, minerals and other land-use charges where national forests are located. The amount is much greater than in past years, primarily because of provisions in the National Forest Management Act of 1976. The base on which the state shares were figured for 1977 includes credits made to timber purchasers for

building roads and funds used by the Forest Service to improve timber sale areas. These were not previously included in the 25 per cent share base. The money is earmarked for roads and public schools with Morrow County budgeting 75 per cent to roads and 25 per cent to schools. Oregon leads the nation in its share of the total \$224,576,711.06 being distributed to 39 states and Puerto Rico.

HEPPNER—LEXINGTON—IONE Course Descriptions

INTERMEDIATE GUITAR A continuation of beginning guitar.

CALLIGRAPHY This class will include the following: manuscript lettering with various calligraphic forms. Script and show card lettering with the brush. Advanced students will begin to work with Oriental calligraphy.

MICROWAVE COOKING A basic introductory course in electronic oven cooking designed to help the new user of the Microwave oven. Sessions will include food preparation and cooking by class members as well as discussions of utensils, accessories and recipe adjustments. Ownership of an oven not required in order to take the class.

GENETICS Basic principles of Genetics presented in a lecture-lab form.

BASIC MATH Review of basic skills including percents, ratios, and solving simple algebraic equations.

BEGINNING TOLE PAINTING Designed to teach the student the basic elements of tole and decorative painting. Work is done from patterns with application to a great variety of home decorations. Student does not need any background in drawing or sketching.

CROSS COUNTRY SKIING Will provide the student with basic skills and skiing techniques; course will include instruction on winter preparedness and survival.

BEGINNING SWEDISH Basic conversational Swedish taught with Swedish book, dictionary, and work sheets.

PHYSICAL FITNESS FOR WOMEN Exercise period and recreational games.

INTRODUCTION TO FILM & FILM SERIES The purpose of the course is to develop visual literacy. Feature films will be viewed weekly and discussed in terms of aesthetics, society, history, and directors.

EXPECTANT PARENTS CLASS This class is designed for the expectant couple. Courses will cover preparation for the parents-to-be, what to expect at the hospital, and care of the new mother and the newborn. Breathing and relaxation exercises (LaMaze technique) are emphasized to prepare the couple for a controlled labor and delivery.

CERAMICS This class will include following: 1. learning to develop functional and decorative objects from clay; 2. working with basic principles pertaining to slab, wheel, and coil pottery. The art of Raku firing.

TOLE ON CLOCKS Prerequisite of beginning tole. Painting will be done on various clock patterns.

BEGINNING GUITAR Learning to play simple guitar solos by reading music notation for guitar.

HERMISTON SELECTED COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

PRIVATE PILOT GROUND SCHOOL Instruction in principles of flight, meteorology, navigation, aircraft and engine operation, flight instruments, flight information publications, radio communications, and flight problems. Students completing the class should have sufficient knowledge to pass the Federal Aviation Administration written examination for the Private Pilot certificate.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIANS REVIEW The class meets the State of Oregon relicensing requirements for Emergency Medical Technicians.

STAINED GLASS An introduction to working with stained glass using both lead cane and copperfoil methods. Basics of pattern development, glass cutting, soldering, and use of tools will be emphasized.

REAL ESTATE PRINCIPLES Class will meet first class Tuesday, January 3, thereafter on Mondays. This is an introductory course for those entering the real estate industry. The course assumes no prior real estate knowledge or experience. It provides a broad, general overview of the functions performed, the applicable laws and regulation, and the details involved in the buying and selling of real property.

SURVEY OF ENGLISH LITERATURE Study of the principle works of English literature based on reading selected to represent great writers, literary forms, and significant currents of thought.

REAL ESTATE LAW This is a follow-up course to the introduction of legal topics presented in Real Estate Principles and Practices. It applies Ore-

gon Real Estate Law to ownership use and to transfer of real property. This course will involve contracts, titles, deeds, leases, liens, covenants, conditions, restrictions, easements, estates, probate and landlord-tenant relationships.

SOCIAL ISSUES Contemporary social issues, poverty, violence, alcoholism, racism, and other issues related to the American social structure as viewed from the sociological perspective.

LIVING AND LEARNING WITH BABY The class deals with the development of the infant from birth to one year. The infant and parent attend class together in order to interact and observe the concepts being taught. Some topics to be covered include the infant's needs for a sense of security and love, physical care, and stimulation of his visual, speech and muscle development. Adult's needs for coping with changing family relationships will also be discussed.

MOVEMENT EDUCATION FOR PARENTS AND THEIR CHILDREN Parents and their pre-school children can share the benefits of exercise, relaxation and creative play in a new kind of class designed specifically for the parent to "guide" his or her child. Parents learn to recognize conceptual development, efficient movement, sensory functioning and positive self-image behavior in their children.

BLUEPRINT READING COURSE will include detailed examination of blueprints, layouts, interpretations; some time will be devoted to graphics as they apply to blueprint reading.
