Politician hits campaign trail

Politicing has already begun for next November's gubernatorial election and one candidate, Democrat Marv Hollingsworth found Heppner on the campaign trail last week.

Hollingsworth, 41, a Portland attorney, has been campaigning full-time since April and for the past month he and his wife and two children have been traveling around the state in a motor home donated by supporters.

"I've been shaking hands wherever I can find them," Hollingsworth said.

The native-born Portlander considers himself much more conservative than Gov. Bob Straub, especially with regards to government spending the death penalty and community support.

Hollingsworth admits that he doesn't know much about the problems of Eastern

Oregon, but said "that's why I'm here, to listen to people. I'm learning more all the time." Last week's trip was his third visit to Eastern Oregon, stopping in Pilot Rock, Hermiston, Heppner, Lexington and Arlington.

If elected governor, Hollingsworth said he would establish "town halls" in Oregon cities to maintain a close contact with the people.

He served in the Oregon Legislature during 1971-72, was a pro tem district court judge and is a charter member of the Mt. Hood Community College Board of Directors. Hollingsworth describes himself as "a father, taxpayer, home owner and businessman."

Specific issues Hollingsworth supports include: death penalty for aggravated, premeditated killings only; mandatory sentences for felons;

state controlled gambling with proceeds to pay for schools and reduce property tax; expansion of existing hydro power rather than nuclear power; and development of non-nuclear energy forms. He advocates turning the OLCC

into private enterprise with wholesale prices to licensees; repealing LCDC; and merging agencies.

Hollingsworth for Governor headquarters are located at 2004 N.E. 102nd Ave., Portland.

The 1978 edition of the Farmer's Tax Guide is now available at the Morrow County Extension office, according to Harold Kerr, County Extension agent.

"The Guide explains how tax laws apply to farming situations and has examples and illustrations showing how different items should be reported," says Kerr.

One significant change in regulations affects employer taxes. If farmer-employers meet either of two tests explained in the Guide, they will be required to pay federal unemployment taxes. The Guide discusses how to compute and deposit the unemployment tax.
