

Shooting drought hurts Fillies

A dismal shooting fourth quarter by the Fillies allowed Stevenson to rally for a tie and send the game into an overtime period where the Washington team pulled out a narrow 41-40 win in the opening round of the girls White Salmon Tournament.

The Fillies led most of the way, starting the game with a

halfcourt press which they used to build a six point first quarter margin. Stevenson came back to tie the game at intermission but a strong third period staked Heppner to a 32-20 lead entering the final quarter.

From there, nothing seemed to go right as Heppner managed only six points in the

final quarter while Stevenson rallied for 16 to tie the game after regulation play and then pulled out the overtime win.

"The breaks just didn't go our way towards the end," said Filly coach Sherri Brock, noting that Heppner shot 50 per cent from the floor in the opening period but dropped to only 15 per cent in the fourth.

Heppner turned the ball over 25 times while recording 42 possessions gained in the game.

Diane Holland scored ten points while Jackie Mollahan, Maureen Healy and Lori Rhea each had eight. Healy and Wendy Myers led the team in rebounding with seven and eight, respectively.

Fillies sunk by late foul shots

Two foul shots by Columbia in the final minutes of play sent the Fillies home from the White Salmon Tournament without a win as Heppner dropped a 30-27 decision in the consolation match.

As was the case in the opening matchup of the tour-

namment, the Fillies had a hard time finding the basket—shooting 21 per cent from the floor. Heppner did show improvement at the foul line where they made good on 50 per cent of their attempts.

Coach Sherri Brock said good defense by both teams

kept the scoring totals low and added that Heppner's 17 team fouls compared to 13 violations charged against Columbia was a deciding factor in the game.

Julie Grieb led the Fillies with nine points followed by Wendy Myers with six and

Jackie Mollahan and Diane Holland with four. Maureen had eight in the losing effort.

The loss was the fourth of the year for Heppner with each of the losses being decided by four points or less. The Fillies now stand 4-4 on the year.

Fish and Wildlife Dept. offers special licenses to pioneer and seniors

With the time for renewal of hunting and fishing licenses at hand, the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife offers two special licenses available to

older sportsmen at a substantial discount.

Both of the licenses, the pioneer and senior citizen, are available only from the Port-

land office of the Fish and Wildlife Department. Application can be made by mail, however, on forms available from Portland or regional offices of the Department or from most county clerks.

The pioneer hunting or fishing license is for residents who are at least 65 years of age and who have lived in Oregon for at least 50 years.

The hunting and fishing licenses each cost \$1 until age 70 when the pioneer is entitled to a free permanent license. A "pioneer" who is between 65 and 70 can pay for pioneer licenses through age 70, in which case he will be issued a permanent license immediately. By doing so it costs a little more initially, but the bother of renewing each year between age 65 and 70 can be avoided. If during these years he chooses to renew annually, renewal is due on his birthday, not at the end of the year.

The pioneer license holder is also entitled to a reduced fee elk tag for \$2.50.

Senior citizen hunting and fishing licenses are for residents who are 70 years of age or older who have lived in

Oregon at least five years. This license is free and applicants are issued a permanent license. One disadvantage of this license is that senior citizens must pay full price for the elk tag.

There is one other kind of license that causes some confusion. The disabled war veteran hunting and fishing license is available to those who have resided in Oregon for at least one year immediately prior to application and who are certified by the United State Veterans Administration to be at least 25 per cent disabled.

In past years the Fish and Wildlife Department was provided a list by the Veterans Administration listing all those who qualified. Due to new federal privacy laws, however, they can no longer do this. So the disabled vet must get a certificate of proof from the Administration himself and submit it with his application. Cost of the disabled veteran hunting license is \$1, the fishing license is \$1, or a combination is available for \$2. The disabled vet is also entitled to a reduced fee elk tag which costs \$2.50.

ted the Mustangs season mark to 7-1.

Dale Holland was the top scoring Mustang with 17 points followed by Bryan Marlin with 12 and Dennis

Peck with 10. Lyle held a slight edge in team shooting percentages, connecting on 37 per cent from the floor while Heppner canned 33 per cent of its shots.

A big statistic in the game was the Mustangs 51 to 26 rebounding advantage with Jerry Cutsforth leading the way with 11 boards. Holland added 10 and Marlin and Howard Huddleston both col-

lected eight.

Heppner also showed an improvement at the free throw line where they converted on an even 50 per cent of their attempts.

"The game was close for three quarters but then our defense helped us take over," Mustang coach Tom Day said of the game. "It was a little different from our first game in the tournament."

Day said he was pleased with the play of Huddleston who collected his eight boards in less than quarters and also turned in a good defensive performance while guarding Lyle's star, Mark Austin. Day also credited Marlin with a good all around tournament.

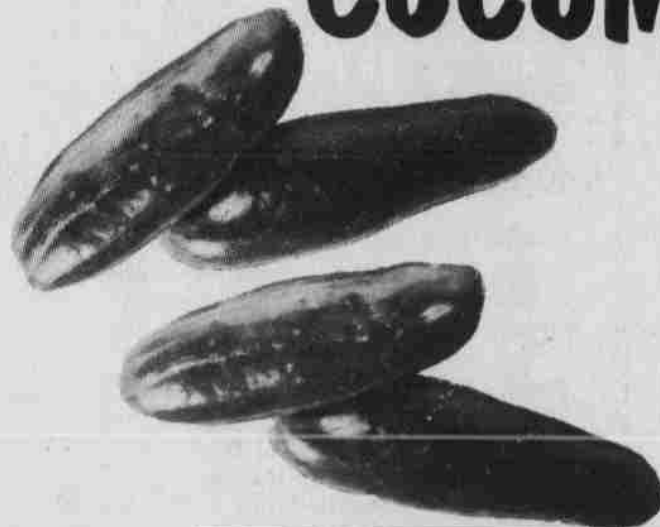
