HEPPNER-LEXINGTON-IONE Course Descriptions

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

TENNIS For persons with basic knowledge and skills in tennis who wish to improve their skills. **DRAWING** Class will deal primarily with pencils and charcoal. Some exploration with ink. Course will include discussion and training in observation and selection of significant elements.

WELDING Course consists of set-up and operation of oxyacetylene welding equipment. Demonstration and practice in fusion, cutting and brazing on ferrous and non-ferrous metals. Some cutting will be done.

BOTANY Class will be oriented toward field trips to familiarize the student with some of the various plant communities types in Oregon. Information presented on basic plant terminology and identification. Identification will include herbs, grasses, shrubs and trees. Ecologic principle of plant and animal community occurrence will be discussed. Field work beginning four weeks into quarter will be required.

PHYSICAL FITNESS/WOMEN Exercise period and organized recreational activities. **EXPECTANT PARENTS** This class is designed for the expectant couple. Course will cover preparation for the parents-to-be: what to expect at the hospital, and care of the new mother and the newborn. Breathing and relaxation exercises (the Maze technique) are emphasized to prepare the couple for a controlled labor and delivery.

ADVANCED TOLE PAINTING Student must have painting experience. Painting will be done first on paper and will proceed to the painting of wood.

HISTORY OF WORLD WAR II The course will involve a reexamination of the origins, conduct, and consequences of the World War, 1939-1945. Moving from a study of the inter-war years and the dynamics of Nazism, the course will progress through the major campaigns (with an emphasis on the European theatre) using recent studies of strategy, diplomacy and leadership as they bear on the outcome of the war and development of post-war societies. Students may take the course for credit or audit.

BASIC SPOKEN SPANISH Beginning Spanish taught in the speaking-listening method. Emphasis on pronunciation and simple sentences. The course will provide opportunities for practical conversation on everyday topics, current events and cultural materials.

INTERMEDIATE TOLE PAINTING Continuation of beginning tole painting. Student should have completed a basic course. **MULTI-MEDIA ART** Art forms included in the course will be those chosen by the student such as clay, watercolors, etc.

GUITAR Students will learn to play simple guitar solos by reading music notation for guitar. **UPHOLSTERY** Introduction to the basics of upholstery, students will cover simple objects to learn the techniques involved.

MICROWAVE COOKING A basic introductory course in electronic oven cooking designed to help the new user of the Microwave oven. Sessions will include food preparation and cooking by class members as well as discussion of utensils, accessories and recipe adjustments. Ownership of an oven is not required to take the class.

GOLF A four-week course for adults with limited prior golf experience.

HUNT SEAT RIDING Class will include both lecture and demonstration periods. Topics for discussion include mounting, dismounting, correct posture at all gaits, leg and rein aids, diagonals at the posting trot, and leads at the canter. Student will practice backing and transitions and learn to perform a turn on the forehand. Instruction in jumping may be available for those students who are interested.

UMATILLA COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

PHYSICAL FITNESS FOR WOMEN This course will include physical exercises and conditioning as well as various activities which can be used during leisure time.

BASIC SEWING This course is designed for persons with little or no knowledge of sewing, to develop skill and confidence in the use of the sewing machine and other sewing equipment, selection and handling of fabric, and use of a commercial pattern. Several projects will be completed during the class.

WOODWORKING Students will be taught the use of hand and power tools along with methods of assembly and finishing. Students will construct projects of their choice with limits of ability as determined by their instructor.

BOARDMAN COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

INTERMEDIATE TOLE PAINTING Students must have completed one term of tole painting.

MICROWAVE COOKING A basic introductory course to electronic oven cooking designed to help the new user of the Microwave Oven. Sessions will include food preparation and cooking by class members as well as discussions of utensils and accessories, recipe adjustment and other information techniques pertaining to microwave cooking.

HERMISTON SELECTED COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

HERMISTON COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

ACCOUNTING PROCEDURES An introduction to accounting for beginners as well as a refresher for persons who had some training and/or experience, an introduction to payroll accounting.

AUTO TUNE-UP Learn to develop skills to diagnose and repair engine malfunctions. Students will learn how to tune fuel and electrical systems in the automobile.

REAL ESTATE FINANCE The course will deal with the methods for financing the acquisition and transfer of real property. It will consider the mortgage, trust deed and land sale contract as it relates to the financing and refinancing of real property.

PRACTICAL ANIMAL NUTRITION The course is designed to familiarize those interested in feeding horses, cattle, sheep and swine with the nutritional requirements of the animals. Examples will also be used to show how local feeds can be fed to obtain desired performance or production.

MOVEMENT EDUCATION Parents and their preschoolers can share the benefits of exercise, relaxation and creative play. Parents learn to recognize conceptual development, efficient movement, sensory functioning and positive self-image behavior in their children. Class is limited to 3-5 year-old children and their parents.

HUMAN DEVELOPMENT The psychological development of the child, adolescent, adult and aged as influenced by maturation and socialization. Examination of differing environments and their effects on growth and personality. Introduction to research techniques and methods related to the observation of development.

FAMILY AND SOCIETY Study of the historical developments of the family as an institution, its structure and function, and the changes in contemporary American society. Emphasis is placed on those changes that produce social and individual stress.

SMALL GAS ENGINES Course will include instruction in a variety of small gas engines including lawn mowers, chain saws, rototillers, pipe line, etc. Students will gain an understanding of the operation, maintenance and repairing of 2 and 4 cycle gas engines.

APARTMENT MANAGEMENT The course is designed to help the manager of apartments to improve management skills. Topics for discussion will include regulation and practices, management policies, operation and maintenance, rent-up, etc.

PRINCIPLES OF SUPERVISION The course is to provide first line supervisors with the practical knowledge and skills they require to perform their duties as supervisors, through the development of effective management, communications and leadership skills.
