

League of Oregon Cities meets in Pendleton

A discussion of Home Rule, annexation and plans for the 1979 legislative session will highlight a League of Oregon Cities regional meeting in Pendleton Tuesday, April 25.

Pendleton Mayor Joe McLaughlin has invited officials of cities in Morrow and Umatilla Counties to attend this meeting, which is one of 20 that the League is presenting throughout the state this spring.

The afternoon workshop and general discussion will be held at Indian Hills Red Lion, 304 S.E. Patawa Road, Pendleton.

At the evening dinner meeting the League president, Portland Commissioner Charles Jordan, will review League activities, plans for the 1979 legislative session and major issues of importance to cities. Local state legislators have been invited to attend the dinner meeting and join in the discussion of legislation affecting cities. The dinner will begin at 6:30 p.m. at Indian Hills Red Lion.

The meeting will begin at 1 p.m. with afternoon workshops focusing on current issues and problems in the fields of finance and budgeting, personnel practices, risk management and recent legal developments. A training session for elected officials will put participants in a "council" setting and use a film and workbooks to present problem-solving situations that are common to policy-setting boards.

At 4 p.m. an open forum general discussion will give city officials an opportunity to

develop their own agenda of topics while bringing up questions of local concern. League staff will be available to serve as resource persons for this session.

Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) loans are now available to Morrow County producers interested in building high-moisture forage and silage storage facilities on their farm or remodeling existing storage structures, according to Judy Buschke, county executive director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASCS) office.

Previously, loans were available only for construction of new structures for high-moisture grain or grain silage, and dry grain.

"The loans will benefit

dairymen and livestock producers who need storage for grass silage, and also grain producers with storage facilities that need modification and remodeling to increase capacity and efficiency," Buschke said. She added that

facility loans are secured loans and borrowers must provide adequate security to protect CCC's interest.

CBEC shows 10% consumption jump

A summary of Bonneville Power Administration's Generation and Sales Statistics was received this week by Columbia Basin Electric Co-op.

The local co-op showed a 10.5 per cent purchase increase over the previous year, compared to an average

increase of 8.3 per cent for the 53 BPA customers in the same grouping as CBEC. The co-op's power purchases for 1977 amounted to 136,533,000 kwhr which was the 17th highest ranking in the group.

The average rate of power paid BPA by Columbia Basin continues to run well under the

group's average, and for 1977 was 13 per cent below the average.

BPA's sales to cooperatives showed a substantial increase compared to sales in other classes. Sales to municipalities dropped 15.8 per cent while sales to PUDs increased by 3.9 per cent.

EXPLANATION OF BALLOT QUESTION

Currently the tax base of \$43,974.00 is inadequate for the general operation of the City. If the tax levy is approved, the operating budget to be financed by local taxes for the fiscal year 1978-79 will be \$38,689.00 greater than the operating budget financed by local taxes for the current fiscal year.

The reasons for increasing the levy are: Two additional employees, plus funding for the Library, Swimming Pool, and increases in materials and supplies, employment salaries, payroll taxes, and insurances, all necessary for the betterment of the operation and maintenance of the City of Heppner.
