

Cards netters battle Viks, Honkers

Sweeping positions 1 through 3 in both singles and doubles, Ione's lady Card netters cruised to a 6-1 victory over Arlington Monday while the second-line boys team dropped its abbreviated match by a 1-2 margin.

Posting wins for the girls were Susan Thompson who beat Darcy Weatherall in the top singles match, Carol McElligott at number two and Natalie Tews at number three. Tammy Tucker lost her match in the number four singles slot.

Carol McElligott and Darcy Rea won their number one doubles match as did Natalie Tews and Jeanie Piening at number two and Martha and Michelle McElligott at number three.

In boys matches, Clint Carlson beat Joe Silvas in the top singles match but Jerry Rietmann lost at number two and the doubles team of Duane Fetsch and Mike Leavitt also lost.

The previous week, top singles player Rick Gilbert and the top doubles team of Dennis Stefani and Dan McElligott both notched match wins but Umatilla took the remaining matches for a 4-2 win. Losing to the Viks were Clint Carlson and Duane Fetsch in singles and the doubles teams

Mustangs crush opponents

Heppner flexed its track muscles by placing at least two entries among the top four finishers in 10 of 15 individual events in a four-way competition last week in Heppner.

The Mustangs totaled 88 points to easily outdistance Condon with 53½ and Oregon Trail with 41½. All but one of the Ione tracksters were busy on the baseball diamond and the Cardinals were limited to a pair of points.

Terry Starr represented Ione with fourth place finishes in both the shot and discus where he recorded respective throws of 40'6" and 109'4½".

The only double winner in the meet for the Mustangs was Todd Sherer who ran the 800 in 2:14.8 and cleared the pole vault bar at 9'. Other individual Heppner wins came from Dave Piper (6' high jump),

won her singles match and doubles teams of Natalie Tews and Jeanie Piening and Martha and Michelle McElligott each came out on top. Natalie

Bryan Marlin (38'10½" triple jump), Richard Schmidt (19'3½" long jump), and Marty Smith (48'2" shot).

Jim Parker aided the Mustang cause with a second in the shot (42'7"), third in the discus (113'11") and fourth in the javelin (124'9½") while Mike Jones, Marlin, Schmidt and Dan Nix each gained two second places. Jones ran the 100 meters in 12.6 and the 200 in 28.0, Nix covered the 1,500 in 4:38.2 and the 3,000 in 9:58. Marlin went 18'11½" in the long jump and 142'8½" in the javelin, Schmidt high jumped 5'10" and triple jumped 38'10½".

Other second places came from Piper (2:16 200), Smith (121'11¼" discus) and Sam Myers (19.6 110 high hurdles).

Healy, Holland lead Filly win

Behind four first place efforts by Maureen Healy and two more by Diane Holland, Heppner's Fillies edged out Oregon Trail to take team honors in a four-way track meet in Heppner last week.

Healy's wins came in the high jump (5'4"), 400 meters (63.8), 110 intermediate hurdles (18.7) and the 200 (27.9) while Holland topped the field in both the shot (33'2" and javelin (105'10"). The Fillies also got five points from Susan Johnson's winning time of 36.0 in the intermediate hurdles.

Team scores showed Heppner in front with 57 points, followed by O-T with 52, Ione with 24 and Condon with 11.

Cardinal wins were recorded in the 800 where Lisa Meyers ran 2:49.1, the discus where Janet McElligott threw

74'6½" and the 1,600 relay where the team of Brenda Patton, Margaret Kincaid, Teena Lindstrom and Lisa Meyers was clocked in 4:55.7.

Adding to Heppner's winning total was Holland's second in the discus (69'4½"), Johnson's third in both the 200 (31.0) and long jump (13'1½"), Kellie Hammond's third in the shot (29'11") and fourth in the 100 (14.6), Bonnie Nix's third in the discus (63'2½"), Alice Abram's third in the 1,500 (6:24) and Laurie Harrison's third in the 100 (14.5).

Cardinal points were scored by Kincaid (second in the long jump, 14'7") and fourth in the 200, 31.7), Lindstrom (third in both the 200, 39.5 and 110 hurdles, 20.3) and McElligott (third in the javelin, 84'7").

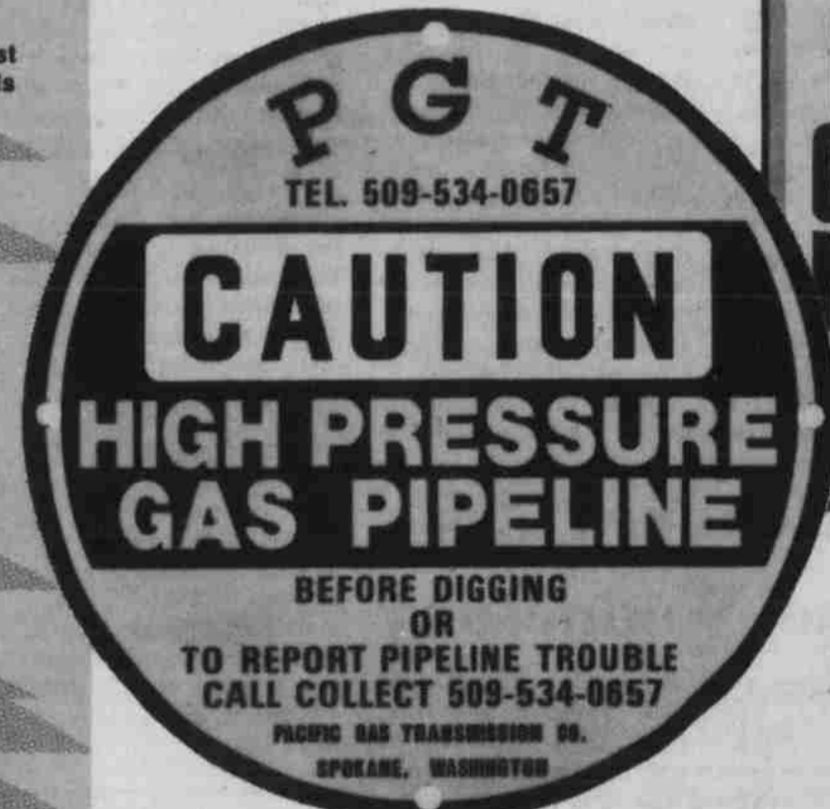
