The Heppner High School Band gained a one minus rating at the District 6 large group band contest held in LaGrande Wednesday, April 26. "I thought they did tremendous," band instructor Jim Ackley said about his students' efforts. "They impressed me and a lot of other

people in LaGrande." Though the band also rated a one minus last year, Ackley said the students played much better at last week's contest. Two judges rating the bands' performances gave Heppner a top one rating while the third lowered the average with a two plus score.

The Heppner Junior High band rated a two plus average with the judges giving scores of one, two plus and two. A top one rating went to LaGrande Symphonic Orchestra and Pendleton High School band. Also rated one minus were bands from LaGrande, Helix, Baker, Pilot Rock and

Pendleton Junior High. Two pluses were earned by Weston McEwen and Hermiston High schools, with Helix Junior High and Oregon Trail and Umatilla bands rated with a two score. Oregon Trail Junior High gained a three rating.

Committee marks settler grave sites

The Grave Marker Committee of the Morrow County Historical Society spent a productive day recently on a trek through the mountains in the southern part of the county placing markers on previously neglected gravesites of early settlers.

The group went first to Luke Bibby's place, marking the graves of two children, identified as a Scherzinger baby and a Steward baby. Marie Leghorn, The Dalles, and Mr. and Mrs. Bill Stewart, Wolf Creek, relatives of pioneers J.W. and Anna Hanby Stewart, accompanied the committee to the gravesites. The Stewart family moved from the county in 1909.

After a noon pot-luck dinner at Rhea Creek Grange Hall, markers were also placed on Copple family graves, dating from the 1890s, on the Hamilton Ranch; graves of McKenzies at the Glavy Ranch; on the burial place of John Ricks on Chapin Creek; on the grave of a child of Ona Robinson; and on the burial spot of a girl named Spencer on a point between Chapin and Rock creek.

Persons working on the project Saturday were Mr. and Mrs. Harold Becket, Mr. and Mrs. Barton Clark, Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Jones, Ruth McCabe, Elsie Leathers, Rachel Harnett and Rick Smith.

They were joined by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Burch and son Eddie of Portland. Burch is the son of Nellie Hanby Burch, now living in a nursing home in McMinnville at age 96, and the late Aaron Burch.
