

## POLICE BLOTTER

Two members of a six-piece band that played for Lone High School's prom night festivities last weekend were arrested early Sunday morning on the school parking lot on charges of possessing marijuana.

Facing misdemeanor charge for criminal activity in drugs, possessing less than one ounce of marijuana, are Richard Dale Johnson, 22, and Stephen Paul Filer, 19, both of Boise.

The arrests were made by Morrow County Sheriff's deputies.

Hearings for the Boise pair were scheduled for May 15.

A 19-year-old Irrigon woman was slightly injured May 5, when the motorcycle she was operating struck a trailer being towed by a pickup on Hwy. 730, one mile west of Irrigon.

Caroline Ballard was reportedly knocked temporarily unconscious in the collision, but refused treatment when an ambulance arrived at the scene.

Deputies identified the driver of the pick-up and trailer as Scott Kenney, 17, of Hermiston. He was cited for defective equipment.

A Silver Creek, Wash., man pleaded guilty Monday in Morrow County Justice Court to charges of driving under the

influence of intoxicants and operating a vehicle with a suspended license.

Herbert Charles Meyer, 58, was fined a total of \$505 for the offenses.

Meyer was apprehended May 5 near Irrigon by Morrow County Sheriff's deputies.
