Ione romps to easy win over Arlington

Ione opened its Big Sky Conference action with a surprisingly easy 58-26 win over a not as tough as expected Arlington team.

Both teams were undefeated and had won big going into the game but the defending state champs from Ione ruled supreme.

The teams battled to a 6-6 tie in the first quarter. Shawn LaRue scored on a 29-yard run but the two-point conversion attempt failed for Ione.

Arlington came right back on a 15-yard pass play for a score and the game looked like it would be a close one.

But Ione ran off 30 points in the second period to lead 36-6 at halftime so the outcome was never in doubt.

In the second period, Gregg Rietmann scored on an 80-yard run but again the conversion failed.

In what was probably the turning point of the game, Dennis Stefani picked up a fumble when Arlington was driving in for a score and raced 75-yards with the fumble for a touchdown. Rietmann ran in for the two-point conversion to make the score 20-6.

Shawn LaRue scored on a 30-yard touchdown run and Rietmann again ran in the conversion as Ione led 28-6.

The final score for Ione in the explosive second period came on a five-yard run by Rietmann. To show that everything was going Ione's way, Ione fumbled the ball on the extra point try but Glenn Krebs, the Ione center, recovered the ball in the end zone so the try was good and Ione led 36-6.

The teams battled evenly in the second half as Ione

outscored Arlington 22-20 in those two quarters.

Quarterback Dennis Stefani opened the scoring for Ione on a five-yard run and he also ran in the conversion as Ione built up an unsurmountable lead 44-6.

Arlington then showed some offense of its own as sophomore Mike Pemberton scored on an 11-yard run but the conversion failed.

Shawn LaRue scored his third touchdown of the night on a four-yard run and Stefani

ran in the conversion but the scoring was far from being over.

Pemberton scored again for Arlington, this tie on a 56-yard run and the pass for the conversion was good. The Honkers scored again on a five-yard pass play from their sophomore quarterback Caly Bittenger to Wilkins and Arlington trailed 50-26.

The last points of the game came when Jeff Hams ran back a kickoff 75 yards.

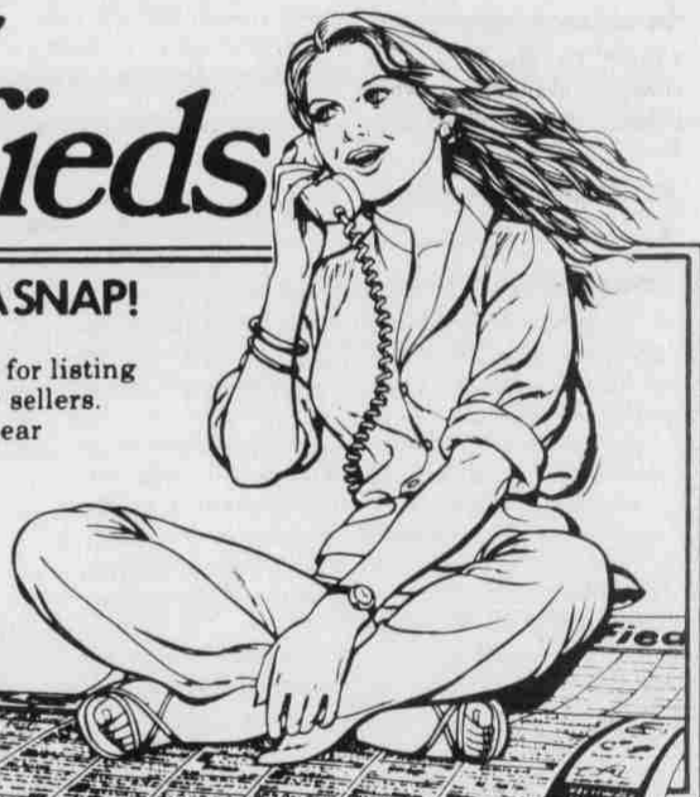
