## Lexington Grange advocates gasohol research funds

Resolutions adopted by the Lexington Grange recently include one in support of funding for research on using alcohol for motor fuel.

The resolutions were introduced at the Oct. 15 meeting, when Larry Lindsay of Ione spoke on his attendance at a one-week, intensive training school dealing with the use of gasohol as an alternative fuel.

Other resolutions adopted by the Grange were in support of protection for the Willow Creek watershed and opposed U.S. Senate Bill 14, that would increase to 1,200 acres the amount of land eligible for government assistance for irrigation.

Lindsay said the school on gasohol was held at Lindsay, Kansas. It was attended by farmers, engineers, chemists, industry and research personnel. There was such a demand for the information that it has

been repeated many times. It was the consensus of those in attendance, he said, that fuel from a renewable source such as vegetable matter is a much more practical means of furnishing fuel needs than oil and coal, which is not renewable.

Although it is a rather expensive fuel, the by-products could be used for livestock feed of a higher nutritive value than the original product.

Lindsay said Brazil is now using alcohol as fuel and both Chrysler and Volkswagens have been exporting cars that will operate on this fuel.

There is a bill in Congress to set up an \$800 million loan fund to back up the alcohol industry to make more use of it as fuel. Not many have gone into the production of alcohol because of the many government regulations and licensing.

## ROTC scholarships applications are now being accepted by Air Force

U.S. Air Force spokesmen at Oregon State University have announced that applications for Air Force ROTC four-year college scholarships are now being accepted from high school seniors for fall, 1980. Seniors can obtain applications from their high school counselors or the Air Force ROTC office at Oregon State University.

Air Force scholarships cover full tuition, lab fees, and books, as well as providing \$100 per month tax-free.

Seniors are encouraged to mail their applications as soon as possible to be eligible for early scholarship selection. The final date that applications can be accepted is Jan. 15, 1980. Applicants must take the Scholastic Aptitude Test or

the American College Testing Program test no later than December, 1979, and request (by using AFOTC Code 0548 on the test registration form) that the testing agency submit results directly to AFOTC.
