The Heppner women's volleyball team was knocked out of the Class A state playoffs in the first round when the team lost Friday night to Enterprise 15-8 and 15-8.

The team was bothered by the low ceiling on the Enterprise court. Enterprise was used to the court and therefore the sets on that side of the net were lower so their spikers could get better shots.

The Big Sky Conference champion Ione Cardinals had a bye in the first round of the state playoffs and will take on North Powder, who won its first round game over Mount Vernon 26-14, Nov. 17.

The game will be played at Eastern Oregon State College in LaGrande beginning at 1:30 p.m. Adults will cost \$2.50 and students \$1.50.

The Cardinals played North Powder earlier this year with Ione winning 22-0. North Powder has gone undefeated since that game. The two teams clashed last year in the playoffs with Ione winning that one.

The other semi final game will be between Prospect and Valzeto. That game will be played in Prospect at 1:30.

Sen. Packwood works to improve health care

Sen. Bob Packwood has renewed his efforts to improve home health care for the elderly, his office reports.

The Packwood bill, which has been introduced in the United States Senate, expands homemaker-home health aide services, and reforms current law which requires an individual to be "homebound" to be eligible for home health services.

With the population of senior citizens growing rapidly, Packwood argued that home health care has proved to be a highly effective way to meet many of the elderly's medical needs. "Not only does home health care help seniors remain independent in the comfort of their own homes, but it also reduces health costs by cutting back on hospitaliza-

tion and nursing home stays," Packwood said.

Under present law, the Medicare program allows home health aides to provide only limited "homemaker" services, such as light house-keeping or meal preparation. The Packwood bill eliminates the restriction on homemaker services, which should make the delivery of services to seniors more efficient.

The second provision would permit seniors to receive home health services in adult day care centers. These centers care for seniors who, in general, are unable to care for themselves and whose families are unable to provide for them during the day. Many states and communities have set up such facilities.
