Janice Healy of Heppner has been selected by the Pendleton Round-Up Board of Directors to reign as queen of the 1980 Pendleton Round-Up. Queen Janice is the 20-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Healy. She is a sophomore at Blue Mountain Community College in Pendleton, is a consistent point winner on the BMCC Rodeo Team and last year was a member of the rodeo team representing the Pacific Northwest at the Calgary Stampede.

The 1980 Queen was a princess on the 1979 Round-Up Court and her mother, the former Kathryn Lazinka, was a Round-Up Queen in 1950.

Serving on the 1980 Court with Queen Janice will be Cindy Dougherty also from Heppner, Elizabeth Lybarger of Hermiston, Nita Nichols and Lisa Snow, both from Echo.

Princess Cindy is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Dougherty. The nineteen-year-old is a sophomore

at Walla Walla Community College, majoring in Interior Design.

Princess Elizabeth (who makes her home in Hermiston with her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Walt Pearson) is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W.R. Lybarger of Lake Oswego. This 18-year-old is a freshman studying business at Eastern Oregon State College in LaGrande.

Princess Nita is the 20-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Nichols. Nita plans to continue her education as a junior at Oregon State University aiming for a career in photography.

Princess Lisa is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dick Snow of Echo. Nineteen-year-

old Lisa is presently employed at Hamleys and has her sights on a career as an airline stewardess.

Ione basketballers defeat Condon

by the Ione journalism class Ione's Cardinals, beginning to shake the remnants of the football wars, scored its first basketball victory of the season with a 55-54 win over Condon's Blue Devils on the home maps last Saturday night.

Balanced scoring was the key with three Red Birds, Mark Patton (16 points), Dennis Stefani (13) and Treve Peterson (12), hitting for double figures and two others not far behind with Jim McCabe having eight and Gregg Rietmann six points. Leading the scoring and rebounding was Mark Patton who had a total with 19 boards. Following Patton's scoring were Dennis Stefani, who by his own admission is putting the ball up on the boards as though he were still throwing 60-yard passes, and Treve Peterson.

The visiting Blue Devils put on a charge in the final stanza with a press that the Birds handles to preserve the victory.

Stefani did not have one of his better shooting games as he made only five of 23 shots.

"The third and fourth quarters were critical for us," said Coach Del LaRue. "We trailed 28-20 at halftime because of

only 22 percent shooting from the field but we shot 38 percent in the second half during our comeback."

LaRue said his team outbounded Condon 48-34 and they won the game at the free throw line hitting 6 of 8 in the last quarter.

Ione's next game is Jan. 4 when the team plays Umatilla at home.

Blue Devils down Ione

Condon's Blue Devils ran to a first quarter 9-2 lead, saw it melt away trailing 13-11 at halftime and then put on a full court press for the remainder of the encounter to double the score on the homestanding girls Ione Cardinal team as Condon downed Ione 35-18.

Leading scorer on the floor was Condon's Jennifer Bauman with eight buckets from the floor, four from the charity stripe, to single-handedly outproduce the point total for the lady Cardinals.

Tammy Holtz led Ione with eight. Liz McElligott and Lisa Meyers had four each, and Diann Morter had two points.

Racial discrimination case dismissed

A suit filed by 18-year-old Kevin Grigsby of Portland against the C&D Drive-In in Boardman charging racial discrimination was dismissed Dec. 14 because of lack of "substantial evidence."

Jane Hartline, Bureau of Labor public information officer, said the suit was filed Sept. 3 by Grigsby, who is black, who said he was refused service in the restaur-

ant Aug. 12.

Grigsby has also filed suit against Combustion Engineering Inc. and Boilermakers Union Local 72 on similar charges. He said he was afraid for his life the two days he worked at the Portland General Electric Carty coal-fired plant in Boardman.

Hartline said none of the other suits have been settled yet.

Gross farm sales in county decline

Gross farm sales for 1979 in Morrow County were estimated to be \$72,145,000 according to Morrow County Extension Agent Harold Kerr. This compares to \$72,531,000 in 1978, a decline of less than one percent.

Wheat was the number one crop with total sales of \$34,170,000, up 19.8 percent from 1978. The large increase was due to an increase of 14,000 acres of irrigated wheat. Overall yields increased slightly. Wheat was produced on 212,000 acres in Morrow County.

Potatoes declined almost seven million dollars to \$17,710,000. The 39 percent reduction from \$29,262,000 in 1978 was due to 7,000 less acres being farmed, a 10 percent loss in yield and a 6 percent lower price.

Other crops total sales were \$10,356,000, up 28 percent from last year. Crops included in this total are barley, corn,

Heppner grad to Iran

A naval aviation mechanic whose parents live in Heppner is serving with the U.S. Navy task force that is steaming in the direction of Iran.

In the words of a U.S. Navy press release, Rory K. Stillman, aviation structural mechanic 2nd class, is serving aboard the aircraft carrier USS Kitty Hawk, which has been "deployed to the Indian Ocean."

Stillman is the son of George F. and Virgena Stillman of 210 W. Speery, Heppner. He is a member of Attack Squadron 94 (VA-94), based at the Naval Air Station, Lemoore, Calif., and currently aboard the Kitty Hawk, operating as a unit of the U.S. 7th fleet.

VA-94 is part of a carrier task force which departed the Philippines for the Indian Ocean to join another task force operating there. Nineteen U.S. Navy ships are operating in either the Indian Ocean or Arabian Sea areas with more than 14,000 U.S. sailors and Marines aboard. Port visits are scheduled in African and Middle Eastern countries.

A 1972 graduate of Heppner High School, Stillman joined the Navy in May, 1972.

Grain producers eligible for loans

"All corn, sorghum and barley producers will be eligible for target price protection and price support loans on their 1980 feed grain," Judy Buschke, executive director of the county agricultural stabilization and conservation service office, said.

"There are no set-aside or diversion requirements for 1980 feed grain crops."

"However, to qualify for full target price protection and deficiency payments, farmers cannot plant more corn, sorghum or barley in 1980 than the total acreage considered planted and set aside from these crops in 1978," she explained. "Farmers who exceed this acreage will be subject to an allocation factor that can reduce any target price payment by up to 20 percent."

Preliminary target price

ranges will be announced by March 15, according to Mrs. Buschke. The 1980 target prices are currently estimated at \$2.08 per bushel for corn, \$2.46 for sorghum and \$2.35 for barley.

An ASCS official said 1980 feed grain and soybean loan levels will be at least as high as those in effect for 1979 crops. Those rates are: \$2 per bushel for corn, \$1.90 for sorghum, \$1.63 for barley, \$1.03 for oats, \$1.70 for rye and \$4.50 for soybeans.

National program acreages were announced at \$2.1 million acres for corn, 13.9 million acres for sorghum and 7.9 million acres for barley. The national program acreage is the number of planted acres of each crop needed to meet projected domestic and export requirements as well as to provide for a desirable carry-over.
