

# Cards entertain Umapine tomorrow

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35 points as Umapine won 61-58.

LaRue said Gordon Meyers of Ione scouted Dufur and Meyers said Dufur is the best team he has seen this year.

"They are a running club, very quick and play good defense," LaRue said. "Their guards harass you and they run all the time."

LaRue said they are big inside with players 6-foot-4, 6-foot-3 and 6-foot-2. Dufur beat Helix last week 56-22 and is 4-0 this year in league play.

Against Wheeler Monday night, Ione broke open a close game in the third quarter with a full-court trap press that caused 28 turnovers while Ione only made eight.

Ione led 29-27 at halftime. "They had a big kid (6-foot-6 Bill Wehrli) who dominated the first half inside," LaRue

said. "He had 23 boards in the game and most of them were on offensive rebounds in the first half. We made a few adjustments at halftime. He scored 22 points in the game.

Robin LaRue led the team in scoring with 14 points while Mark Patton and Dennis Stefanie had 12 each, Shawn LaRue, Treve Peterson and Jim McCabe all scored 6, and Les Thompson and Gregg Rietmann scored 4 each.

Stefani had six assists, and Patton and Shawn LaRue had seven rebounds each.

Against Arlington, Ione lost the game at the free throw line as the home team made 17-of-34 shots while the Cardinals made 3-of-5.

"We had six more field goals but you can't win too many games when the other team goes to the foul line 34 times," Coach LaRue said. "It

was close all the way. They were hard for us to press because they had good quickness. We did not play as well as we can and we had some mental lapses."

Stefani, Rietmann and Robin LaRue all fouled out of the game. Arlington had more rebounds, 28-20, and Ione made more turnovers, 17-14.

Patton had 10 points and 10 rebounds in the game for Ione. Stefani was the leading scorer with 13 points, Rietmann and Robin LaRue scored 8 each, Peterson scored 6, McCabe 4 and Shawn LaRue 2.

Ione dominated the boards in the win against Echo 49-28 as Patton had 9 and Rietmann 8 boards.

Ione led at the end of the first quarter 24-13 and at halftime 43-25 and they coasted the rest of the way.

"Echo is a funny club," LaRue said. "They have some good personnel and some good shooters and they can beat you on a given night. The way the game started out for the first

four minute I thought this could be the night but it ended up to be a game where everybody played and the players off the bench played well."

Stefani led the high scoring balanced attack for Ione with

18 points with Rietmann and Robin LaRue adding 16 points apiece. Patton scored 12 and Peterson 11. McCabe scored 4 and Glen Krebs, Ralph Morter and Paul Snow all scored two points.

## School board positions open

Winkle of Western Heritage in Heppner for that bank to become a depository for district funds. Doherty said the board already has four depositories and there could be problems with having a fifth bank.

"We could add more and more banks and it could have no end," Doherty said.

Doherty recommended changing the board policy to have one bank take care of the deposits for a two or three year period and then changing banks so they all could have a chance. The board will probably take some of kind of action in July when it usually designates its depositories.

Doherty announced that the state will be reconstructing the bridge on Gooseberry Road across Willow Creek near Ione High School. The board said they would agree to grant them a permit of entry and right-of-way. Doherty said the creek will be straightened there and a temporary bridge put in until the permanent one can be built.

The school board decided to advertise to sell the 1970 van that was totaled last month in a wreck and they put it up for bid. Jim Wishart came up with the idea of letting students in auto shop work on the van but the school principals said they did not have the facilities to work on it so the decision was made to sell it.

Principals Vic Marchek at Columbia Jr. High and Susan Balek of Sam Boardman Elementary School were re-hired for their second year on a probationary period.

The school board discussed the effects of the Kinzua Mill closure in Heppner on school attendance but none of the principals in Heppner or Ione said they have noticed any significant drop. They did say that there could be a drop by the end of the year if some new job opportunities in the area are not developed.

Doherty reminded the board that four school positions expire this year. They include Jean Bennett's four-year term, Pauline Winter's four-year term, Jim Wishart's one-year term and John Mat-

thews four-year term.

Positions are also available on the advisory committees to the school board. Three positions are available from Heppner, two from Ione, two from Boardman and two from Irrigon. Anyone interested in filling any of the positions can contact the school district office in Lexington at 989-8123.

### Sabre sold

Sabre Farms in Boardman is in the process of being sold to Sunriver Farms, an Oregon-California corporation, and as a result of the change, about two-thirds of the labor force on the farm will no longer be needed.

Sunriver plans on growing winter wheat on 12,250 acres, dried beans on 2,000 acres and alfalfa on 1,750 acres. Sabre Farms mostly grew potatoes but also soybeans, sweet corn, green peas, white beans, wheat, alfalfa and had pasture.

Sabre Farms employed 55 workers, 155 during harvesting.

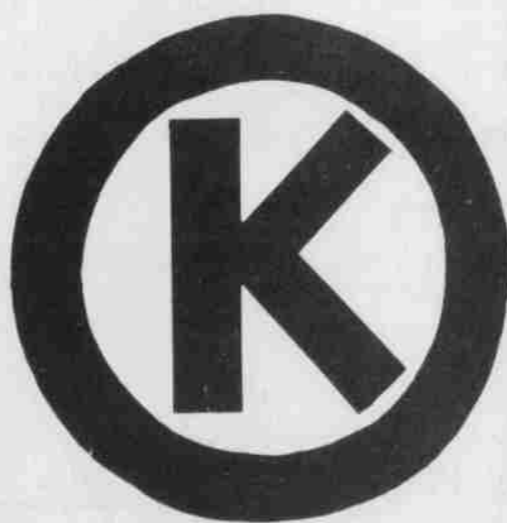
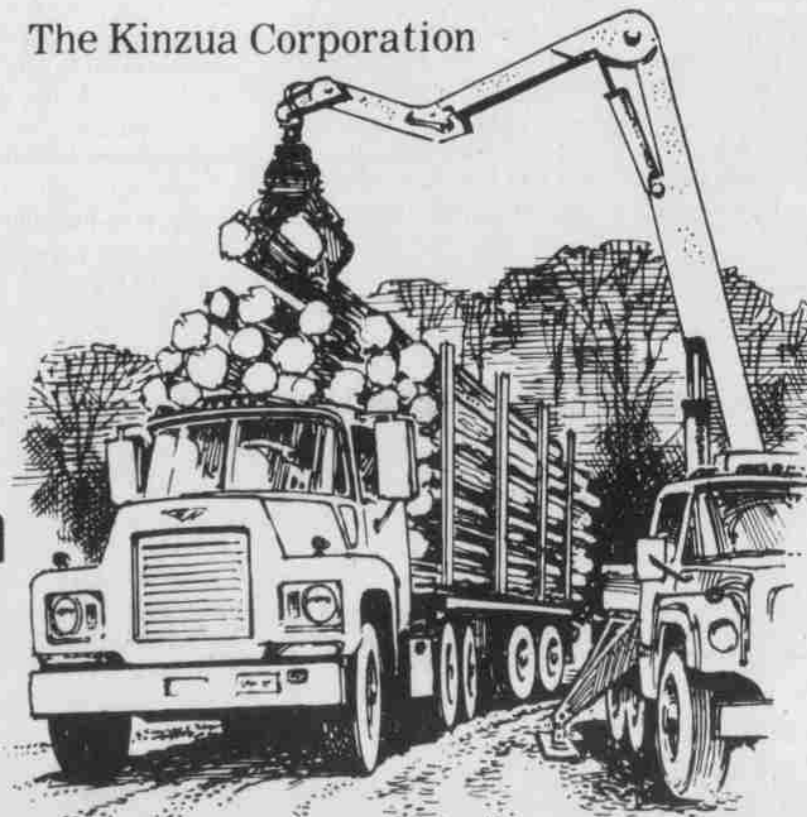
