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Single mothers have low income problem

Many single mothers must travel the same economic low road as migrant workers and new immigrants, according to an Oregon State University professor.

"There are about 17,000 divorces annually in Oregon, and a majority of the women from these divorces must try to survive on incomes that are less than half what an average husband-wife family makes," said Arthur E. Gravatt, professor of family life.

According to a 1976 U.S. Census report, an average husband-wife household in Oregon grossed \$14,812 annually. The same figures show an average single parent female earned an average gross salary of \$7,328.

"Most single parent women who work are trapped," said Gravatt, co-author of "Oregon Family Profile," a 210-page book published by OSU's school of home economics that contains in-depth information about single mothers.

"Single parents women's position, their earning power, is similar to young persons just entering the labor market. Single mothers are usually paid entry-skill wages, and their economic status is not unlike that of migrant workers or new immigrants from Southeast Asia.

"For example, statistics say men with an elementary

education gross an average of \$6,182 a year and women with the same education make only \$2,438," he added. "A high school diploma means an average gross salary of \$12,254 for men and \$4,117 for women. Men with four years of college average \$13,674 annually as compared to \$5,972 for women with the same education."

Using another example to point out the plight of single mothers, Gravatt said that if a single parent with three children does not work and receives both food stamps and Aid for Dependent Children, the income will total \$7,164 annually.

"That amount is \$4,000 less than what 1978 Bureau of Labor statistics say a family of four needs to live on for a low, necessity-only budget.

"These women are trapped too," he said. "They can get food stamps and financial aid, but they're also required to look for work. And if they do find work, the food stamp allotment is usually reduced, and the financial aid is usually either cut off or greatly reduced.

"In effect, these women are taxed for going to work," Gravatt pointed out. "And, on top of that, there is no adequate support for child care."

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
