

Jim Parker places first in Willamette shot put

Jim Parker came in first place in the shot put with a throw of 47 feet 10 inches at the Willamette Relays last Saturday in Salem to lead the Heppner Mustangs with the

best individual performance. He also had a personal best in the discus with a throw of 42'3" for fourth place. There were 22 Class A schools that competed in the invitational.

No team scores were kept. The 440 relay team of Mike Jones, Earl Hammond, Buck Estes and Parker was sixth with a time of 48.9 seconds. Earl Hammond was fourth in the novice javelin competition for tracksters who have never competed before.

Larry Palmer led the distance relay team with a 4:54 mile which was "excellent considering the windy weather," Coach Dale Conklin said.

"We weren't in shape and were not ready," Conklin said. "That is as tough a competition as we will have all season, except for the state meet. It was good for us to compete in the valley to see how they are doing down there."

Starr, LaRue set lone discus records

Terry Starr and Michelle LaRue broke lone High School records in the discus throw last Saturday at the Wahlonka Invitational in the first meet of the year.

Lone finished second out of six teams in the boys competition and the girls finished third. Both squads will compete in Condon this Saturday at 11 a.m.

Starr's toss was 130 feet which earned him first place in the invitational. LaRue had a toss of 79 feet and 1 inch to place sixth.

Starr was also first in the shot put with a throw of 40'1". Gregg Rietmann was first in the triple jump with a leap of 39'1". Robin LaRue was first in the 100 meter high hurdles with a time of 16.9 seconds and was also first in the 300 meter

hurdles with a clocking of 45.7. The 400 meter relay team consisting of Duane Fetsch, Gregg Rietmann, Jeff Hams and Robin LaRue was first in a time of 47.1 seconds.

For the girls team, LaRue was first in the high jump with a leap of 4'4". Kim Pettyjohn was first in the 100 meters with a time of 13.3 seconds. She was also first in the 200 meters with a time of 27.7 seconds.

In the boys high jump competition, Les Thompson was third with a jump of 5'6". Jeff Hams fifth with a jump of 5'4" and Shawn LaRue sixth at 5'4".

Jerry Rietmann was second in the pole vault with a 10 foot vault and Les Thompson was third at 9'6".

Gregg Rietmann was sec-

ond in the long jump at 18'7" and Jerry Rietmann was sixth at 16'10".

Jim McCabe was fifth in the javelin throw with a toss of 105'9" and Craig Gutierrez was sixth at 102'6".

Duane Fetsch was third in the 100 meters with a 12.1 time and Jerry Rietmann was fifth at 12.4 seconds.

Hams was third in the 400 meters with a time of 57.3 seconds and McCabe was fourth at 58.7.

For the lone girls, Margaret Doherty was third in the long jump at 14'11" and Pettyjohn was fifth at 14'7". The 400 meter relay team of Pettyjohn, Cindy Hill, Ann Forwood and Doherty was third with a time of 57.4.

LaRue was fourth in the shot put with a throw of 25'5". Hill

was sixth in the 400 meters with a time of 1:15.7. Patti Taylor was fourth in the 100 meter high hurdles at 24.9 seconds and Lisa Meyers was fifth at 26.3. Forwood was sixth in the 800 meter run with a time of 3:28.4. Meyers was fifth in the 300 meter hurdles in 64.2 seconds and Taylor was sixth in 65.4.

For the boys, lone was second with 144 points. Wah-tonka was first with 190. Wasco County won the girls competition with 139 points and lone was third with 60.

"It was windy and cold, not a good track day," Coach Gordon Meyers said. "I was pleased with our performance especially since we had only four days of practice."

Bombing range to have animals?

The United States bombing range near Boardman may become a home for grouse and antelope, according to Glen Ward of Heppner, Fish and Wildlife biologist.

Ward said the Navy and the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife are undertaking a study to see if antelope and grouse can live on the 47,200 acres.

Preliminary plans are to have watering holes on a 20,000 acre section for the animals. Ward said the Navy has its bombing practice using 12-pound smoke bombs so the animals would not be in much danger.

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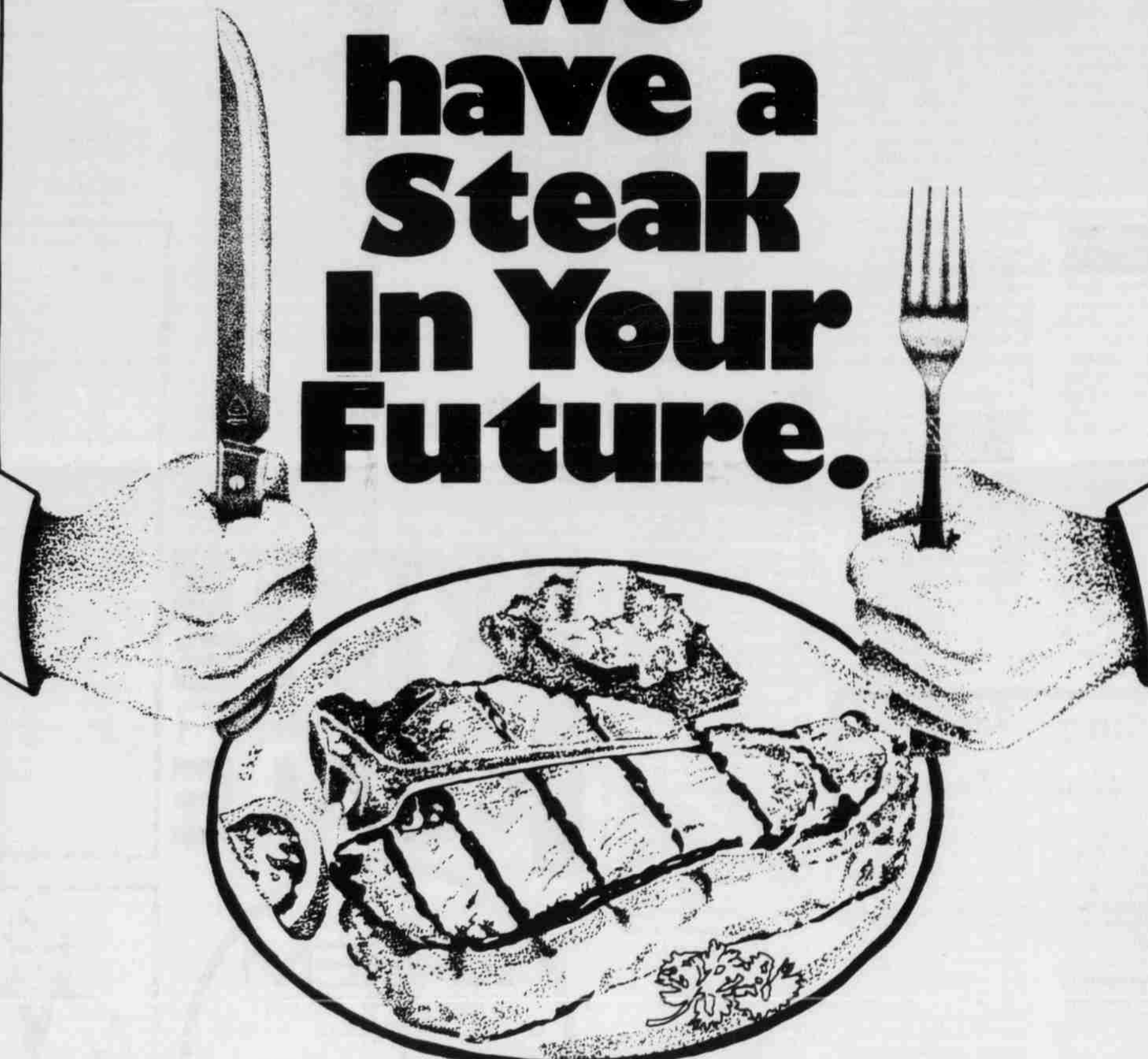
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
