(Continued from Page 3) the area, laying pipe and tying the line into the existing automatic pumping station near Ione.

PGT paid ad valorem taxes amounting to \$73,000 on its pipeline facilities in Morrow County in fiscal year 1979. Hooker said. He said the taxes paid to the county could be tripled when the new line is completed.

Construction estimates issued by the company call for almost 600 persons to be employed in Oregon and capital costs to PGT of \$417 million, including \$24 million in Morrow County alone.

Most citizens received forms for the 1980 Census of the United States this past week.

A census taker should be coming by within the next few days to pick up the form and obtain information that may not have been answered on the questionnaire.

Even though the census only happens every 10 years, it is important to national activity for representation in government and government funding (see page 2 letter from Bob Packwood.)

The U.S. Constitution requires a census every 10 years. The 1980 census will be the 20th count of the nation that has been made.

Individual information collected in the census is grouped by the Census Bureau to form statistical information. All information is confidential.

The 1970 census showed 98,912,192 men in the country and 104,299,734 women.

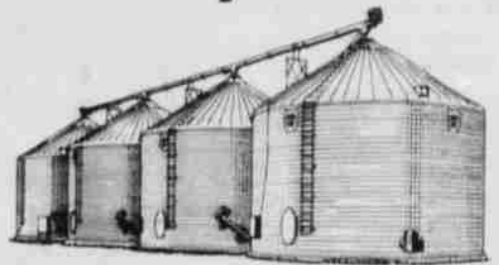
