

Ullman says he's 'not critical' of Carter

Ullman said he is not critical of the President on the handling of the Iranian hostage crisis.

"He has been patient but he has gotten tougher," he said. "We can't let Iran disobey laws of civilization. And we can't back off and let the Russians move in."

Ullman gave the high school students some advice when they go to vote.

"Support real not phony answers," he said. "You can't have tax cuts and still balance the budget. Demand honesty from your representatives. There are no easy answers."

At a breakfast prior to the town hall meeting, Ullman was questioned about corpor-

ate farms.

Orville Cutsforth said the Japanese and Arabs are buying into corporate farms when "farmers are in a pinch to sell out."

Ullman said, "We can't afford to let foreign hands control our farmland but we are not in a crisis situation yet. But in a corporation, it is not too hard to gain control of the stocks so it needs close watching."

Don Peterson said, "Farm prices are terrible and are not in a good relationship with the rest of the economy."

"We have to beef up credit money to farmers," Ullman said. "Agriculture is in a crunch that does not match

inflation. They live on credit."

Dorothy Krebs and John Doherty questioned Ullman about Secretary of the Interior Cecil D. Andrus' statement on the sheep predators like the coyote.

"I will do everything to reverse it," Ullman promised.

Krebs thanked Ullman for his help on securing funds for the Pioneer Memorial Hospital but called Andrus' statement on predator control "ridiculous."

"Russia is number one in the world in wool production while the U.S. uses synthetic oil fibers," Krebs said. "Let's save oil and go back to natural fibers and preserve the sheep industry."

Salem attorney files against Ullman

Salem attorney Steve Anderson filed for Congress in the 2nd Congressional District (Mid-Willamette Valley, Central and Eastern Oregon) in opposition to incumbent Al Ullman.

Anderson, past chairman of the Marion County Democratic Central Committee and Board member of Common Cause, has long been a Democratic party activist since he and Wayne Morse resigned from the Republican Party together to campaign for Adlai Stevenson.

According to Anderson, "I am running against Al Ullman because of his refusal to listen to the grassroots sentiments of the Oregon Democratic Party and his constant pandering to Republican money interests in the 2nd District. Ullman consistently votes with the utilities, oil companies, and aluminum industry. I am going to break his stranglehold on the 2nd Congressional District."

"Ullman has destroyed his credibility within the Democratic Party with his support

of the federal regional power bill that will finance construction of future nuclear power plants and undermine efforts of consumer's in Klamath, Lake, Umatilla, Hood River, Deschutes, Linn, Marion, and Clackamas counties to form non-profit people's utility districts. Our County Democratic Convention called on Ullman to repudiate his support of the regional power bill—unanimously.
