

Congressman Al Ullman shelves value added tax idea to concentrate on balancing budget

Oregon Congressman Al Ullman, in a statement in Washington, said that the immediate economic problems facing Oregon and the nation demand the prompt and full attention of the Congress.

"For this reason, I am cancelling plans for further hearings on comprehensive long-range tax restructuring proposals, including my own plan for reducing income and payroll taxes by \$115 billion and replacing the lost revenue with a value-added tax," said Ullman, who is chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee.

"The agenda of the committee will focus, instead, on proposals integral to congressional and administration efforts to achieve a balanced budget in the upcoming fiscal year and improve the economic environment."

"The recession already is having a dramatic adverse impact in Oregon because our timber—and agriculture-based economy is especially vulnerable to sharp swings in monetary policy and in mortgage and short-term lending rates."

"Businesses and farmers simply can't survive with interest rates at today's levels—none of us can."

"While the prime rate appears to have peaked, a series of special actions will be necessary to increase the flow of available funds and credit to segments of the economy hardest hit by the credit squeeze, including small business, agriculture, housing and the forest products industry."

"This effort will be my first priority."

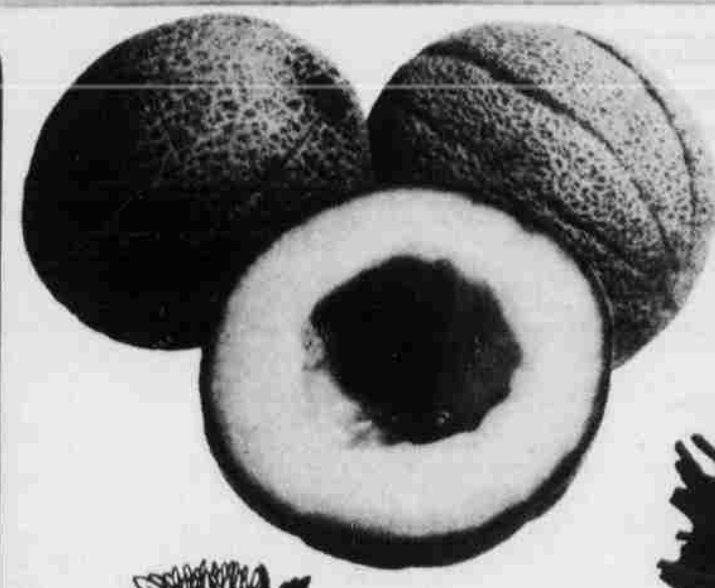
