Mt. St. Helens plan to be developed

The U.S. forest Service in the Pacific Northwest Region is forming a team of specialists to develop a management plan for the Mt. St. Helens area impacted by the volcanic eruption.

R.E. Worthington, regional forester, said the interdisciplinary team will look at both long-range and short-range needs of the Gifford Pinchot National Forest area where Mt. St. Helens is located. Included will be action in coordination with Washington state and county officials to remedy the transportation system in the area, and to deal with some of the mudflows in the Toutle River.

Worthington said other considerations will include plans for the influx of visitors anticipated, the salvage of timber, access to National

Forest lands, and research by the Pacific Northwest Forest

Britt won the high jump with a mark of 4-4 with Janelle McElhaney second and Trisha Mahoney third.

Brenda Pettigrew is going to state with her effort of 15-1 in the long jump. Stephi Payne placed second and Gayle Titus third.

Pettigrew, with a throw of 75-3, and Tracy Burg, with a throw of 69-7, both qualified for the state Junior Olympic meet in the discus competition. Both students are from Boardman. Anne McLaughlin of Heppner was third.

In the 15-and-16-year-old boys competition, Craig Hams was first in the 100 in 12.2

seconds with the qualifying time needed being 11.7 seconds. Gene Wimmer was second and Archie Lucas third.

In the shot put, Wimmer qualified for state with his throw of 37-6 with Cord Adams second and Steve Curtis third.

Orr won the high jump with a leap of five feet.

Craig Hams won the long jump with a leap of 17-11 with Lucas second and Adams third.

Wimmer won the discus competition with a throw of

107-3 with Adams second and Rodney Cole third.

In the 800 meters, Mary Kincaid won it with a clocking of 3:00.4.
