

Morrow schools could lose \$38,000 in Revenue Sharing, Doherty says

Morrow County School District could lose about \$38,000 from Federal Revenue Sharing funds, Superintendent Matt Doherty said at the June

county school board meeting. Doherty said he received a letter from Vern Duncan, Oregon superintendent of public instruction, that said

the state's loss of Federal Revenue Sharing funds would be spread out among all of the school districts in Oregon. Initially, Doherty had said the

impact of the revenue sharing fund cuts would not effect Morrow County. The loss is not definite, Doherty said, but there is a

chance it will impact the county. An updated policy on the use of school buses was adopted at the meeting.

The board decided to discourage the use of buses by non-school groups with an increase in rental fees. Doherty said the board

decided to charge users the amount of reimbursement the district would receive from the state based on mileage and the actual cost of the driver's

time plus the fuel costs. "It is recognized that the use of school buses is occasionally necessary," Doherty explained.

A progress report was given by lone Principal Chuck Starr on the field trip study committee.

According to Assistant School Superintendent John Edmundson, the school board committee will prepare policy recommendations and present them to the school board and its September meeting for review. Edmundson said the instructional value of field trips with the goals and objectives must be presented in more detail by the teachers.

The water system at Columbia Jr. High will not be adequate to provide for future grounds development so Doherty talked to the school board about the possibility of drilling a well.

The City of Irrigon apparently does not have enough water for the junior high to use to irrigate its athletic fields. Interest payments from banks on school district money should be enough to pay for most of the cost of a school district well so it is a feasible project, the board decided.

Members approved the proposed school board meeting schedule for 1980-81 that was printed in last week's Gazette-Times except that the July 21 meeting will be at 8 p.m. instead of 9 p.m.

Concerning the budget, the board transferred \$37,000 for new buses from the 1979-80 budget to the 1980-81 budget.

In other school board action, the following teacher contracts were approved:

Carol Wood, graduate of Eastern Oregon State College in LaGrande, for special education at Sam Boardman Elementary School and Riverside High School.

Roger Records, from Oregon State University, will teach vocational agriculture at Heppner High School.

Cindy Gilliland, from Whitworth College in Spokane, will instruct first grade at Sam Boardman Elementary School.

Karen Shogren, Walla Walla College, is the speech therapist for schools in north Morrow County.

Jan Terjeson, University of Oregon, is the new physical education teacher at Heppner High School.

Laura McDougall, University of Idaho teaches language arts at Lone High School.

Kathleen Sharp, Eastern Oregon State College is the business education instructor at Riverside High School.

Dore Seirson, Eastern Oregon State College, will teach fifth grade at Sam Boardman Elementary School.

Cynthia Smith, University of Puget Sound in Tacoma will teach music at A.C. Houghton Elementary School and Columbia Junior High School in Irrigon.

Laura Broderick, University of California, has been hired to teach second grade at Lone Elementary School.

A number of vehicle bid awards were made:

Two 60-passenger buses at \$23,970 each, and one 20-passenger bus for \$16,131, to Schock Co. Northwest Sales of Portland.

Two 4x4 pickup trucks with factory discounts, at a base price of \$7,200 each to Sherrell Chevrolet of Hermiston.

Compact pickup truck for \$5,197 from Myrick Chrysler-Dodge in Hermiston.

Tires of various sizes, to Hermiston Tire Center, for those required in the north county, and Les Schwab Tire Center in Heppner, for those required in the south county.

Doherty said the split in the tire bid was agreed to because of the distances involved and services available. However, "in terms of average on all tire prices, the Hermiston Tire bid was lower," Doherty said. There were about 30 different prices considered.

A heating-oil contract was awarded to McCall Oil Co. of the Tri Cities, at \$24.15 to
