Congressman Ullman speaks at Sunriver reception

(Continued from Page 1) about the land acquisition and ethanol plant came Friday morning at a press conference in Salem with Governor Victor Ativech and Congressman Al Ullman.

That evening, Ullman spoke at a reception at the Morrow Produce Co. building at the Port of Morrow.

Ullman said the Windfall Profit Tax he helped to pass through Congress gives tax incentives for these types of private enterprise systems. He said it will help bring agriculture back by creating a new market for grains.

He continued, saying the U.S. can produce enough for food and energy with the "tremendous knowledge of today and by cutting waste."

"I think the market (for gasohol) will be there," Ullman said. "I would support a

law that would require every pump station to have at least one gasohol pump but I don't think we will have to do that. Generally, you will get better mileage and performance with gasohol."

Lawrence D. Lindsay began the reception with the invocation. Also speaking at the

reception were: Ronald Dodson chairman of the board for Sunriver Farms; John Cook president; Fred Behrens, Morrow Ag Energy Corp. president; Phillip Stevens, president of Ultrasystems Inc. engineers; and Sunriver Farms Vice Chairman Ray McCoy.

Boardman man gets 10 years

Kenneth Plant of Boardman was sentenced to 10 years in the Oregon Corrections Division on Friday, June 13, by Judge William Wells.

Plant was convicted of armed robbery in the first degree in Circuit Court in Heppner April 10. He robbed a Texaco station in Boardman last January.

Morrow County District Attorney Dennis Doherty said Plant could have received up to a 20-year sentence.

Doherty said the Corrections Division, which includes the parole board, will determine if Plant will be sent to the state penitentiary or the Oregon Correctional Institute.
