**Denny Smith closes gap on Ullman**

Congressional challenger Denny Smith has closed the gap to within six percentage points of veteran incumbent Al Ullman in Oregon's 2nd Congressional District, according to poll results from a survey by the respected national polling firm of Arthur J.

Finkelstein and Associates of New York. While Smith's strength has risen substantially, Ullman's support has dwindled. A similar poll of 407 voters taken by Finkelstein in September 1979 showed Ullman leading Smith 59 percent to 12 percent. Finkelstein's June survey, commissioned by Smith, shows Smith with 39.6 percent to Ullman's 45.8 percent, with 14.6 percent undecided.

**Pressure gauge needs testing**

If you plan to can vegetables at home this summer, now is the time to get your pressure canner gauge tested.

According to Extension Home-Economist Molly Saul, it is imperative that this be done at least once a year. This will insure accurate processing time. Inaccuracies may result in food spoilage and/or food poisoning. Saul states the deadly botulinus poisoning is usually caused by improperly home-canned vegetables.

According to Mrs. Saul, many pressure canners now have a weight on the lid instead of a gauge. In this case no testing is necessary.

All non-acid vegetables, meats, fish and poultry must be processed in a pressure canner. All fruits, tomatoes and pickles should be canned in a water bath. Saul states that it is possible to can fruits in a pressure canner, but that the texture and appearance are better if they are processed in a water bath canner.

**Heppner Library open longer**

Heppner Public Library will be open longer hours for the rest of the summer, July 2 to Sept. 1, according to Librarian Bethal Heinrichs.

Because another person has been added to the staff, the library will be open Monday through Friday from 1 to 5 p.m. It will also be open at its usual times on Thursday nights from 7 to 9 and Saturday afternoons from 2 to 4.

The story hour will still be Thursday mornings at 10:30. The public can use the library at that time.

**July**

Garden hints from your OSU Extension Agent

- Dig and sort dahlias; divide iris.
- Control aphids in dahlias to prevent virus diseases; destroy infected dahlias.
- July 5-10: spray filbert trees for filbert worm.
- July 10-15: spray peach and prune trees for root borers.
- July 17-23: third spray for codling moth in apple and pear trees.
- Control powdery mildew in grape plants with series of sulfur sprays.
- Spray for scale insects on camellias, holly, maple trees.
- Spray for root weevil adults in rhododendrons, azaleas, other ornamentals.
- Mid-summer plantings of beets, bush beans, carrots, cauliflower, broccoli, lettuce.
- Watch for cutworm damage in garden.
- Check leafy vegetables for caterpillar attack. Control with Dipel or Sevin.
- 12-spotted beetles may be sprayed or dusted with rotenone or Sevin.
- Eastern Oregon: where corn earworm is a problem, spray as silking begins. Protect bees.
- Oregon coast: plant Chinese cabbage, kohlrabi, rutabagas.
- End of month: prune raspberries, boysenberries, other caneberries after harvest.
