State Fair offers Craft Courtyard

Artists will be busily fashioning things—from paper, from glass, from iron, from gold. They will be typical of the craftsmen creating their versions of the 1980 Oregon State Fair theme, "Heritage Into the 80's."

"The Craft Courtyard has grown in just a few years to one of the most popular attractions at the fair," according to Fair Director Dwight Butt. Artisans forging wrought iron, blowing glass creations, carving wooden toys, crafting leather goods, creating individualized jewelry and shaping pottery, will be among those demonstrating their talents and answering questions of fairgoers.

"The Craft Courtyard will open daily at 10 a.m. all ten days of the fair, August 23 through September 1," according to July Mullin, superintendent of the Courtyard. "In all, we will have about 25 craftsmen, each demonstrat-

ing a different expertise," she said. In addition, there will be entertainment on the Craft Courtyard stage, including puppetry, blue-grass music, mime, and juggling.

"It's a fun place," Mullin said, "especially for senior citizens, many of whom used to practice some of these self-same arts, and for children, most of whom have not seen how these crafts are created."

"And even the artisans learn from it," she noted.

"Often, a senior citizen who once practiced the craft out of necessity, can suggest a short-cut or easier way to do a certain step in the crafting process."

STREAMWOOD, Ill.—With increasing numbers of plants being kept in homes, the horticulture market continued to grow last year. A survey found that more than 80 percent of U.S. households grow plants. Of the estimated 236 million planters bought in the U.S. during 1979, more than half were plastic.

More than 53 percent of the respondents said they kept more plants in 1979 than during 1978. On average, Americans kept a total of 21 planters in their homes, up from 10 in 1975. Of those keeping plants, 45 percent said they expect to keep even more in the future.
