Pope honors four priests of Diocese

Four priests of the Baker Diocese of the Roman Catholic Church have been named by Pope John Paul as honorary prelates of His Holiness with the title of Reverend Monsignor. Bishop Connolly announced last week.

The priests are Fathers Raymond H. Beard, John Phelan, William Stone and Charles Grant.

Word of the appointments was received through the office of the apostolic delegate in the U.S. No date has been scheduled for the Mass of Investiture.

Father Beard, pastor of St. Mary's Parish, Wasco, is a native of Oregon. He attended St. Francis Academy, Baker, and then St. Edward Seminary, Kenmore, Wash. He was ordained June 7, 1941, at St. Francis Cathedral, Baker, by Bishop Joseph McGrath. Assignments have included St. Francis Parish, Milton-Freewater; St. Patrick's Parish, Heppner; and St. Pius X

Parish in Klamath Falls.

Father Phelan, pastor of St. Joseph Parish, Prineville, was born in Ireland. After attending the seminary at St. Keran's College, Kilkenny, he was ordained June 8, 1941. Among his assignments were also St. Francis of Assisi, Milton-Freewater.

Father Stone, pastor of St. Peter Parish, The Dalles, was born in Athens. He went to school in The Dalles, graduating from St. Mary's Academy. He attended St. Edward Seminary, Kenmore. He was ordained June 4, 1943, at The Dalles. He, also, has been a pastor of St. Francis Parish, Milton-Freewater.

Father Grant, chancellor of the Diocese, was born and reared at LaGrande. He graduated from Columbia Prep, Portland, and the University of Portland. He attended Mt. Angel Seminary and was ordained at Our Lady of the Valley Parish, LaGrande, on May 25, 1958.

Ullman introduces legislation to restrict fed. land acquisition

Oregon Congressman Al Ullman said recently he plans to hold hearings in the 2nd District on his legislation to restrict federal land acquisitions.

"This measure is aimed at correcting the situation existing today in which federal agencies unnecessarily acquire private land, thus removing it from the tax rolls," said Ullman.

"Land acquisitions by federal agencies follow no overall policy and, often, the acquisitions cause maximum friction with local authorities and residents," Ullman said.

Ullman's legislation (H.R. 8141) would:

- Establish uniform policies, procedures and restrictions to be followed by federal agencies before considering acquiring private lands.

- Require an opportunity for public hearings in which the proposed acquisition is thoroughly examined.

- Require an exchange of equivalent lands for the lands proposed to be acquired on the request of the local authorities in areas where more than 50 per cent of the land is already owned by the federal government.

- Provide local authorities and private landowners with a clear, impartial and consistent process of appeal of unnecessary land acquisitions.

- Reimburse costs and legal fees incurred by landowners in any action for condemnation in which the federal agency has not complied with the basic procedures.

- Require periodic reports and closer Congressional oversight and review of future federal acquisition activities.

Ullman said the schedule of hearing dates has not been set; but said he plans the local hearing particularly in those counties where the vast majority of the land already is owned by the federal government.
