Grieb Angus, Lexington, is among beef cattle exhibitors registered for the 70th annual Pacific International Livestock Exposition Oct. 11-19 at the Expo Center off the I-5 freeway in North Portland. The Grieb ranch is showing ten head in the Angus division.

The traditional PI horse show, intermingled with five standard events of Professional Rodeo Cowboy Association approved professional rodeo is the main arena entertainment for the show. A separate country variety show is also included with general admission. In the circus-like livestock section some 3,500 farm and ranch animals will be shown and judged in eight huge tents.

The show is open daily from noon to 11 p.m. with the horse show-ropo nightly at 7:30 plus 1:30 p.m. performances Saturdays and Sundays.

General admission is \$3.50 for adults, \$2.50 for senior and juniors 6-14. Arena show reserved seats, including grounds admission, are \$6 for adults, \$5 for senior citizens.
