

Juvenile Services commission draws plan; sets hearing

The Morrow County Juvenile Services Commission met on Monday, Oct. 6, in Boardman to formulate a plan to submit to Oregon State Juvenile Services Commission in an attempt to qualify for \$13,000 in state monies targeted for juvenile delinquency programs.

The commission has prepared a plan, says a commission spokesperson, which would include a recreation program for the South end of Morrow County and subsidization of a "Latch-Key" program for Boardman.

The recreation program would be aimed at providing constructive activities for youth in Heppner, Ione and Lexington communities.

This program would include a basketball program for boys and girls in the 4th through 6th grades, a high school boys' summer basketball program, a junior bowling program for boys and girls in the 5th through 12th grades, and a community movies program for people of all ages.

The "Latch-Key" program would include day care before

and after school in Boardman. The Juvenile Services Commission will hold public hearings on the proposed plan on Monday, Oct. 13, in Heppner and Boardman at 7:30 p.m.

tips on wine:

Here's a secret every gourmet cook knows—wine helps round out the flavor of almost any dish you are serving. All of the alcohol evaporates beyond the boiling point, and only the flavor remains.

One of the most common mistakes in cooking with wine, however, is an overdose of the grape. Experts suggest that you follow a recipe carefully to achieve an optimum blend of flavors. If you decide of your own accord to add wine to a dish, add only a tablespoon or so at a time, and taste before adding more.

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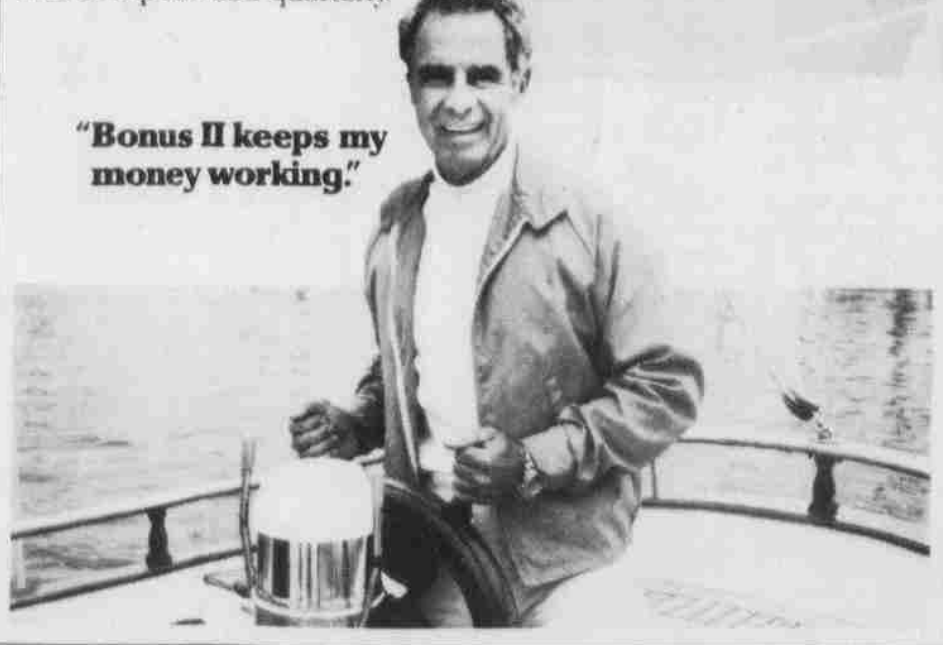
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
