

# Bier aids Mustangs as they down Huskies, 21-12

Quarterback John Bier completed 12 passes and ran for 35 yards last Friday night as the Heppner Mustangs downed the Sherman Huskies 21 to 12.

The Mustangs were red hot in the passing department, with Bier first hitting Tony Currin for 20 yards, then coming back to nail Rick Cole with a 46-yard pass which was good for a touchdown and the Mustangs' first score. Doug Holland made the extra point which put Heppner up, 7-0.

The second quarter started with Sherman's ball on their own 30-yard line. After three attempts they had gained only eight yards, so with fourth down and two they went for it. Heppner's Earl Hammond came up with a sack, however, and the Mustangs took over.

The Mustangs first play was a handoff to Holland which was good for six yards up the middle. Bier got into trouble on the next play and had to scramble with the ball. He gained 6 yards and then pitched out to Holland who added another six to rack up a

sizeable gain.

Heppner then ran the ball for another two yards, and then Bier opened up with good blocking for a run of 20 yards. On the next play Heppner showed once again they can pass the ball when Bier let loose on a 25-yarder to Rick Cole, good for six points. Holland tagged on the extra point to make the score Heppner 21, Sherman, 0.

In the second half Sherman worked the ball on the ground down to the 2-yard line. On the next play Sherman went in for the score, making it Heppner, 21, Sherman, 6.

Sherman tried to make 2 on the extra point try, but Heppner's Brett Sherer was on top of the play and made a spectacular interception to stop the extra point try.

Heppner took the kickoff in the end zone, bringing the ball out to the 20-yard line. From there Bier threw to Currin for 23 yards, and Sherer made 9 yards up the middle.

Heppner's Earl Hammond and Lee Rice were the strengths in the Mustangs' defensive line during the game, hounding the opposing quarterback throughout the contest.

Sherman scored again at the first of the fourth quarter. They missed the extra point, making the score Heppner, 21, Sherman, 12.

After a long high kick by Sherman, Rick Cole took the ball for a 20-yard return. Heppner failed to move the football, however, and had to punt.

The Huskies tried to run the ball against the Mustangs on the next series of downs, however, the Heppner defense was too stout, holding Sherman for no first down.

On the last few minutes of the game, Heppner made two first downs and with 22 seconds left on the clock the Mustangs ran the clock out to end the game.

Sherman's head coach had praise for the Mustang passing attack, saying, "Bier throws a pretty good game." "If it hadn't been for the line to give me so much blocking and time to concentrate on hitting my target, I could never have done it," said quarterback Bier. "The line has all the credit."

Heppner's next game is against Umatilla, at Umatilla, Friday at 2 p.m.

### Cards' winning streak ends

The Arlington Honkers ended the lone Cardinals 26-game winning streak by defeating the Cardinals, 32-22, at Arlington last Friday.

The Cardinals scored first on a 55-yard scoring drive with Shawn LaRue plowing in from the 4-yard line. The pass for the extra points failed.

Arlington's Mike Pemberton broke loose on the third play from scrimmage and ran 58 yards for a touchdown. Lone was then forced to punt.

On the second play after the punt Mike Proctor found a hole in the right side of the line and ran 67 yards for a touchdown. Both tries for extra points failed.

On the first play of the

second quarter Jeff Hams pushed in from the 1-yard line to give Lone their second touchdown. The extra points were good with a Hams' pass to LaRue. The score was then 14-12, with Lone leading.

With about two minutes left in the half Cloy Bittenger threw a 65-yard touchdown pass to John Garrett. Pass for the extra points failed. This put Arlington ahead at half, 14-18.

The Cardinals came out after the half and scored on a 47-yard scoring drive, with Hams shoving his way in from the 1-yard line. The extra points were good with a pass from Hams to Tim Patton.

Proctor broke loose and ran for 61 yards before Mark Patton ran him down. Four plays later Bittenger ran it from the 6-yard line. The pass

for the extra points failed.

The last touchdown of the game came when Arlington's Pemberton broke loose on a draw play and ran in from the 22-yard line. The extra points were good with a pass from Bittenger to Garrett.

Lone had the ball inside the 5-yard line twice, but couldn't seem to get it into the end zone. Arlington's touchdowns came as a result of big plays, while the Cardinals touchdowns were all a result of sustained drives. The turning point in the game was probably the 65-yard touchdown pass before the half. That play sent the Cards to the locker room down at the half, 18-14.

The Cards rushed for 316 yards with Gregg Rietmann having 219 yards and LaRue 61. The Cards passing attack was almost nonexistent, completing only 4 of 18 for a total of 25 yards. Leading rushers for the Honkers were Proctor with 186 yards and Pemberton with 161 yards. Arlington had 380 yards rushing and 68 yards passing.

Coach Meyers summed up the game by saying "We weren't prepared for the quickness that Arlington showed, but we didn't play that bad. I have no real regrets about the game. If we can win the rest of our games we may have a second chance."

Next game will be Thursday, Oct. 9, against Wheeler at Lone. The game will start at 7:30 p.m.

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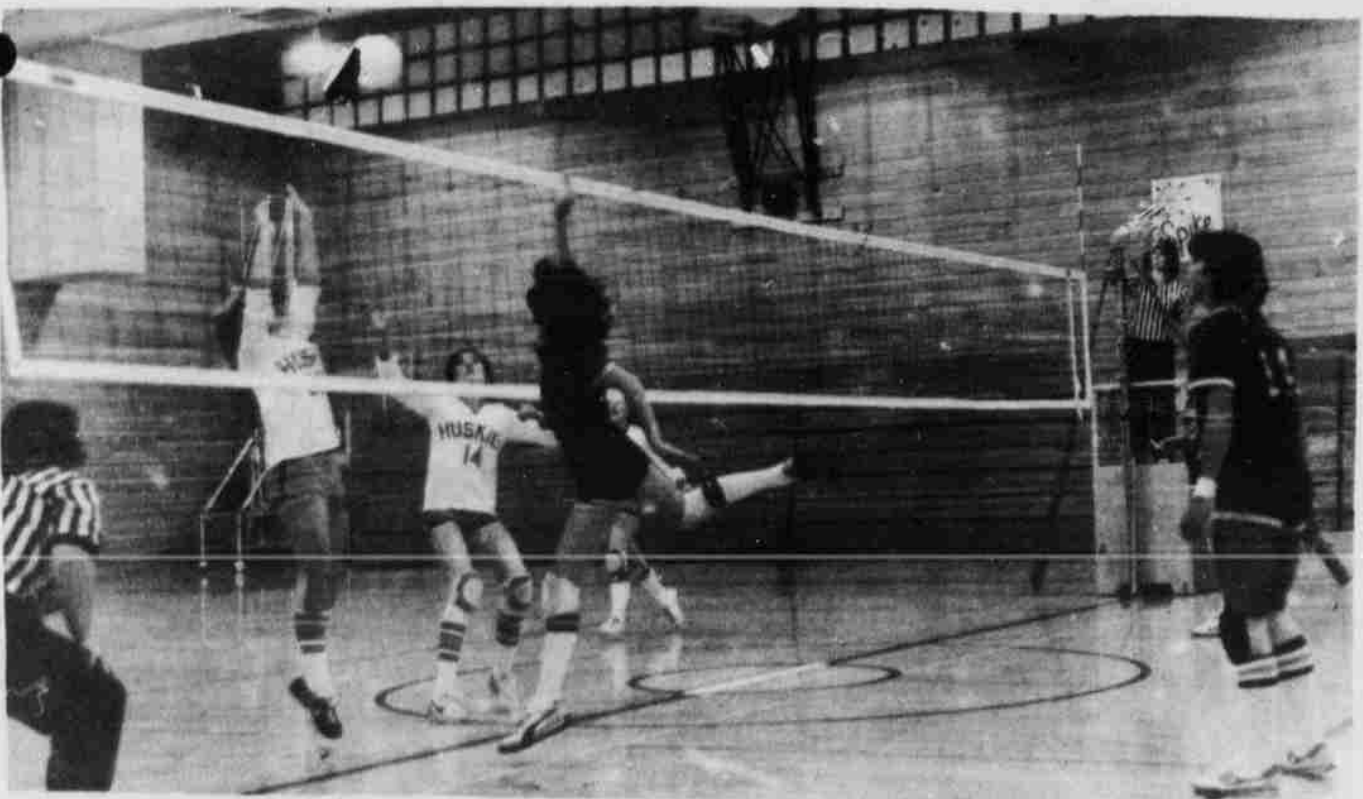
