Halloween night, Pacific Northwest Bell will treat you to a free, 10 minute long distance telephone call anywhere in Oregon if you call between midnight and 2 a.m., Saturday, Nov. 1. Additional minutes will be charged at normal night discount rates.)

Screach out and call your favorite ghoulish friend or monster.

In keeping with the Halloween spirit, Pacific Northwest Bell will treat its Oregon customers to a free, 10-minute telephone call Halloween night from midnight, until 2 a.m., Saturday, November 1. Roy Schnaible, division manager, residence services, says customers can call anywhere in the state, and as long as the call is dialed directly and is no more than 10 minutes in length, it will be free.

"This is an opportunity for those who don't make many long distance calls to make a free long distance call anywhere in Oregon," he says. "The Halloween free call idea is also intended to spotlight the company's low intrastate, direct dialed rates."

"And, I should emphasize

that to be free, the caller must dial the number him or herself, and the call must be no more than 10 minutes long. If the caller places the call through an operator, it will be charged at normal operator rates.

"If the call is longer than 10 minutes, each additional minute will be charged at regular night discount rates." The promotional long distance calling offer is subject to the availability of long distance, direct dial facilities, he says. Customers who receive a busy signal while trying to place their call are asked to hang up and try again a few minutes later.

The Halloween "treat" is believed to be the first such offering in Oregon.

figure, compared to 43.4 in 1978. In Washington only 47 percent of the voters went to the polls for the primary election. In Idaho 41.34 percent turned out; Nevada had 46 percent voting. Grant County led all Oregon counties in May with 67.9 of its 4,552 registered voters casting ballots.

Paulus also attributed this fall's higher projection figure to interest being generated by P.U.D. measures on the ballots in twelve counties and to the controversies surrounding statewide Measure 5 on leg-

hold traps. Measure 6 on the tax limit and Measure 7 on nuclear plant approval. All were initiated by citizen petition, Paulus said, a system Oregon introduced to the nation in 1902 with its history-making initiative and referendum legislation.

County voter registration figures for 1980 should prove more accurate than in previous election years, Paulus added, because voter rolls were thoroughly purged following the 1976 election. Prior to that time, the presence of many names of deceased

persons and people who had moved ballooned the lists and contributed to lower percentage figures.

In the 1980 primary election in Morrow County, a total of 2,378 ballots were counted out of 3,892 registered voters, a turnout of 61.09 percent.

Of the total amount, 1,183 out of 2,032 registered Democrats voted, making a turnout of 58.2 percent; 1,020 out of 1,381 registered Republicans voted, making a turnout of 73.8 percent; and 175 out of 479 of those registered "other" voted, making a turnout of 36.5 percent.

## Regular cooling system check keeps that car working well

Your car's cooling system, like the proverbial chain, is as strong as its weakest link. For real dependability, every part of the cooling system should be in good working order.

Automotive Cooling System Institute lists several areas with which car owners should be concerned as part of fall cooling system service.

Let's look at them:  
1. **HOSES.** Because they must handle coolant under pressure at temperatures up to 265°, hoses and clamps must be secure.

Radiator hoses do not last forever; the normal life expectancy of cooling system hoses is

about three years. When one hose appears to need replacement, it is probably not alone.

When replacing hoses, be prepared to replace at least some of the clamps at the same time.

2. **PRESSURE CAP.** Antifreeze/coolant boils at a higher temperature under pressure than it does at normal atmospheric pressure. Therefore, the role of the pressure cap, which controls the operating pressure of the cooling system, is vital.

When the pressure cap is leaking or otherwise malfunctioning, the engine is likely to overheat.

NOTE: Be sure your replacement cap is the correct type for your car. Also, when selecting a replacement pressure cap consider one with a pressure release feature, a great safety feature that might prevent scalding.

3. **BELTS.** A close examination of drive belts should be part of a periodic under-the-hood check throughout the year. Certainly it is something to be done as part of pre-winter cooling service.

4. **ANTI-FREEZE/COOLANT.** You can keep your cooling system trouble-free for years, if it's clean.
