

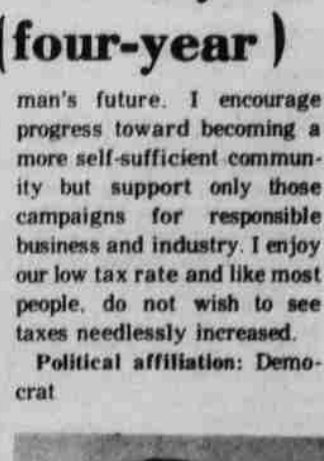

Striking Exception
BARTLESVILLE, Okla.—Despite the spreading interest in employees' health and physical fitness, a survey shows that among many companies only a fraction of workers takes advantage of exercise programs and physical fitness facilities.
A striking exception noted is at Phillips Petroleum, where 6,000 of 7,200 employees are part of the company's fitness and recreation program.
Cost is only \$13 a year for employees' family membership, which covers gym, swimming pool and bowling facilities; exercise rooms; softball fields and a seven-mile jogging trail. The program is 30 years old.

Oregon, Washington agree on I-82 bridge

An agreement between the states of Oregon and Washington involving the construction of a new two-lane bridge and modification of the existing two-lane bridge across the Columbia River at Umatilla as part of the I-82 construction program was approved last week by the Oregon Transportation Commission.
I-82 will extend from a junction with I-84 near Hermiston to a junction with I-90 in Washington, near Prosser. Construction of the bridge is expected to start in late 1982, if funds are available, and construction of the highway in Oregon is scheduled to start in late 1983.
The freeway, to be known as the McNary Highway, is the last Interstate route scheduled for construction in Oregon.
The State of Washington is responsible for the preparation of plans, specifications, advertising for bids, supervision of project construction, and maintenance of the bridge, but plans etc. are subject to approval by the State of Oregon.
Costs for construction and maintenance are to be shared by each state in proportion to the part of the structures on each state. Oregon's share of the total estimated cost of the bridge is \$14,500,000, with federal participation at 92 percent.

BMCC President Daniels urges 'no' on number 6

"There is no question that Ballot Measure 6, if successful, would be very damaging to education in the state of Oregon," according to Blue Mountain Community College President Ron Daniels.
Daniels, as a member of the Oregon Council of College and University Presidents (OCC-UP) supports a recent resolution by that group expressing their strong opposition to Ballot Measure 6, the property tax limitation initiative, on the Nov. 4 Oregon ballot.
"Loss to the BMCC district would be almost two-thirds of current local property tax income," Daniels pointed out. Currently, the college levies a \$1.32 per \$1,000 true cash value in Morrow and Umatilla counties.
"Under figures released by the state, our levy would drop to 50 cents per \$1,000 true cash value at a time when the need for our services is on the increase," the president continued. He pointed to the increase in college enrollment as proof of the need for the college's service in the district.
Daniels summarized, "It is very obvious that we could no longer service local needs under that kind of income reduction."
OCCUP Chairman Dr. John Hakanson of Clackamas Community College noted at the group's recent meeting that the passage of number 6 "would have a devastating effect on the well-being of Oregon for years to come."
The loss of essential services, the severe reduction of educational opportunities for our citizens, the long-term damage to the quality of institutions which it has taken many years to build, all of this would destroy much of what makes Oregon such a wonder-

Final BMCC enrollment figures show increase

At the end of the first week of classes at Blue Mountain Community College enrollment figures showed that 1,012 full-time day students had enrolled, up 42 from last year at the same time.
Part-time students enrolled in continuing education courses offered throughout the college district numbered 1,441. Continuing education courses are organized by area coordinators in Heppner, Hermiston and Milton-Freewater as well as Pendleton.
According to Continuing Education Director Larry O'Rourke, "We have closed a lot more classes throughout the college district because they were full than we ever have." Classes are closed when enrollment reaches an established ceiling which is based on the number of students that facilities can handle.
Continuing Education classes of special interest to adults include: introduction to microcomputers, accounting, aerobic dancing, microwave cooking and English riding. Regular college programs showing overload enrollment include nursing, automotive mechanics and civil engineering technology.
The college currently has a need to find part-time instructors to teach evening courses in outlying areas.
"We are getting requests from Ukiah for evening classes and we need teachers to go there," according to Bill Fenton, Pendleton area coordinator for BMCC. Fenton said he would like to offer more classes in the Ukiah area if he could find teachers willing to drive up in the
