A stop at the Morrow County Grain Growers shop, store and equipment sales complex in Lexington, can net a customer a variety of services. Anything from an overhaul on his tractor engine, to purchase of a new weeder, or even a 10-cent bolt are available to the customer there.

The man who oversees the

hardware store, tire and battery shop, and the petroleum and irrigation divisions, is Lyle Cox, a 19-year employee of first the Lexington Oil Co-op and then the MCGG when the two merged in 1967.

In the shop operation, with foreman Archie Ball, mechanics can repair a piece of

farm equipment, overhaul a tractor engine, or change the brake lining on your pickup truck.

The shop department is backed up by a parts department carrying all the necessary parts to keep a farmer's equipment in running order. The parts desk is managed by Gary Munkers.

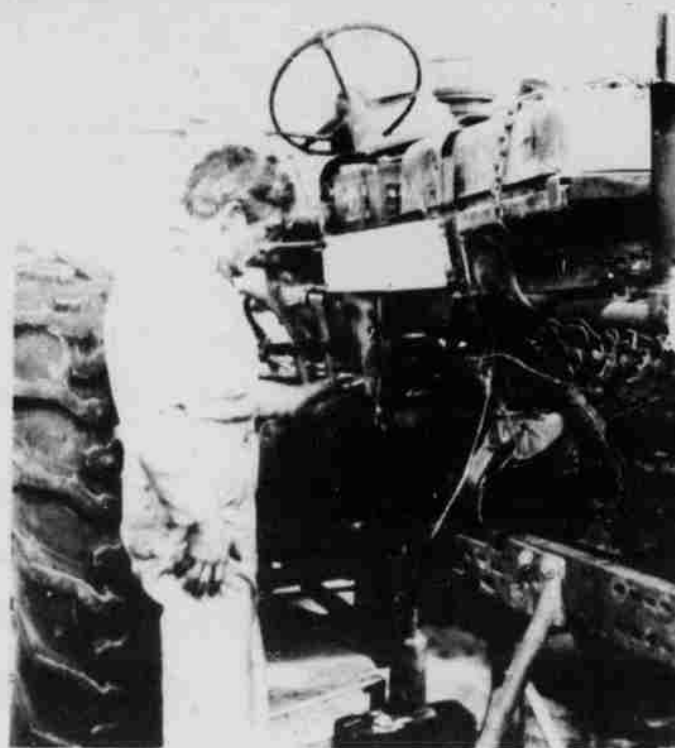
