## Soroptimists visit LaGrande

October 18, Soroptimists Elaine George, Clista Venard, Marlene Gray and Mary Goeben attended the Northeast Oregon and Southeast Washington area meeting of Soroptimist International in LaGrande. Reports were given on the Federation convention held in Denver in July, as well as the District No. 3 meeting in Chelan on Oct. 4 and 5.

The Soroptimist International of the Americas, Inc., the largest women's classified service club in the world, is an international organization made up of four Federations - American, Great Britain and Ireland, Europe and Southwestern Pacific.

The Federation to which the Heppner club belongs is Soroptimist International of the Americas, Inc., with headquarters in Philadelphia, Pa.

Soroptimist was coined from two words, "soro" meaning sister and "optima" meaning the best. Thus, the best of and for women is the goal. Membership is limited to women who do not belong to any other classified service club. (Such clubs presently in existence are Altrusa, Pilot, Quota and Zonta.)

The classification principle, said a club spokeswoman, is the foundation upon which Soroptimist clubs are established and maintained to assure a membership which is representative of the business, professional, and institutional life of the locality in which the club is established. Classifications are determined by activities or services to society rendered by the business establishment (employer) rather than the position held by the individual. The position of the woman determines her eligibility.

The Objects of Soroptimism are:

To maintain high ethical standards in business and professional life.

To strive for human rights for all people, and in particular to advance the status of women.

To develop a spirit of

friendship and unity among Soroptimists of all countries. To quicken the spirit of service and human understanding.

To contribute to international understanding and universal friendship.

To assist in developing the highest concept of patriotism and love of country.

To develop interest in community, national and international affairs.

The five main areas of

Soroptimist activity are: Public Affairs, Community Service, International Goodwill and Understanding, United Nations, and Venture and Youth Activities.

The organization was founded in 1921 and presently has a world wide membership of approximately 66,000 women.

The next meeting of the local club will be the regular business meeting, Nov. 6, at noon at the Wagon Wheel in Heppner.
