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Heppner High seminars slated

A series of seminars for Heppner High School juniors and seniors and their parents has been scheduled for consecutive Thursdays from 7:30 to 9 p.m. at the high school.

Following is a synopsis of the seminars supplied by HHS counselor, Michele Portmann.

Seminar I: "How to Pick a Winner." Nov. 13.

This seminar will cover the variety of reasons to pick one college over another. Information will be given on many of the Oregon schools including both public and private, four year and two year colleges.

Seminar II: "What Are They Talking About?" Nov. 20.

This week's topic will include discussion of the terminology used such as hours, major, grecks, co-op, sequence, etc. During this session students will actually work out schedules using registration materials from Blue Mountain Community College. This will involve the use of college catalogues, schedules of classes and registration forms.

Seminar III: "Prepare for the SAT." Dec. 4.

During this session students will finalize schedules and work on the SAT materials. This is not a cram course, but rather, an opportunity to try the different types of questions and review some test taking techniques. The SAT will be given on Saturday, Dec. 6.

Seminar IV: "How Will I Pay For This?" Dec. 11. Counselor Michele Portmann.

mann will discuss all the local scholarships available and give hints on applying. The FAF (Financial Aid Form) will be distributed and explained. This is the form which is used to apply for all federal and state assistance. This session should be well attended by parents.

Portmann will also discuss the cost of community colleges and four year schools, both public and private.

Seminar V: "Talk To The Experts." Dec. 18.

It is hoped that former students will have completed their finals and will be back this evening to meet with juniors and seniors. They will be asked to discuss things such as class loads, picking a college, housing opportunities, extracurricular activities, homesickness, dorm food, etc. "I am hoping that many students will take the opportunity to attend all or at least some of these sessions," says Portmann. "I will try to make them interesting and informative. If there are topics not mentioned that you would like to see covered just let me know."

On Nov. 24 a representative from Blue Mountain Community College will visit Heppner High School. Pat Loughery, Dean of Students, will present facts and figures about college. To attend this meeting students must sign up in the office.

On Nov. 18 Oscar Stauff, a representative from the Crown Company, will distrib-

ute order blanks for announcements, caps and gowns, and other senior paraphernalia. He will return Nov. 20 to collect the orders. Parents are welcome to come to school on that day to help place orders. The seniors decided they would like to have blue gowns for the boys and yellow for the girls. Therefore, all girls must order caps and gowns. Boys may borrow from brothers or sisters since the blue gowns have been used in previous years.

Moderne Studios has indicated that they will be at the school on Nov. 13 and 14 to accept orders for senior pictures and to take any retakes necessary. Again, parents are welcome to come to school and place orders.

Umatilla Forest exceeds mileage reduction goal

In an energy reduction move, the Umatilla National Forest reduced the mileage driven during the first nine months of 1980 by 29 percent over the same period in 1979.

By improving vehicle scheduling methods, the use of buses to and from the woods where satellite motor pools were located, and a lot more "camping out," the Forest Service was able to exceed their target by four percent for a total savings of 385,000 miles.
