the relief prayed for in its
complaint, to-wit: For judg-

ment (1) requiring defendants
and all persons or parties
claiming under them to set
forth the nature of their
claims, if any to the real
property hereinafter describ-
ed; (2) Determining all ad-
verse claims, if any, of
defendants and all persons
and parties claiming under
them; (3) Declaring plaintiff
as owner and entitled to
possession of said real prop-
erty free of any right, title,
estate, lien or interest of
defendants for those claiming
under them and quieting title
in said property in plaintiff;
(4) In enjoining defendants
and those claiming under
them from asserting any
right, title, estate, lien or
interest in said real property
or any part thereof; (5)
Awarding plaintiff its costs
and disbursements to be taxed
herein; and (6) Granting such
other relief as to the Court
may be deemed equitable and
necessary.

Said real property is situ-
ated in Morrow County,
Oregon, and described as follows:

A strip of land 200.0 feet
wide situated in the South half
of the Southeast quarter of
Section 24, Township 5 North,
Range 26, E.W.M., in the City
of Irrigon, Morrow County,
Oregon, being 100.0 feet on
each side of the hereinafter
described center line of aban-
doned main track of the Ore-
gon-Washington Railroad &
Navigation Company, as for-
merly constructed and oper-
ated, and extending Westerly
from the East line of said
Section 24 to the Easterly line
of that certain eighth describ-
ed parcel of land heretofore
conveyed by Union Pacific
Railroad Company to the
State of Oregon by deed dated
November 7, 1955, and to the
Easterly line of that certain
parcel of land heretofore
conveyed by Union Pacific
Railroad Company to John C.
and Arilda A. Swearingin by
deed dated December 12, 1955;
said center line of abandoned
main track being described as
follows:

Beginning at a point in said
East line of Section 24, that is
611.2 feet north, measured
along said East line, from the
southeast corner of said Sec-
tion 24 thence Southwesterly
along a straight line forming
an angle of approximately
76-degrees 26' from South to
Southwest with said East line
of Section 24, a distance of
139.9 feet to the beginning of
a tangent curve concave North-
erly, having a radius of 2864.93
feet; thence Westerly along
said curve, through a central
angle of 16-degrees 04', a dis-
tance of 803.3 feet; thence
Westerly along a straight line,
tangent to the end of said
curve, a distance of 1452.9
feet, more or less, to a point on
said Easterly line of said
deeded parcels of land, here-
inafter referred to, and the
terminus of the center line
hereby described.

ALSO an irregular shaped
strip of land situated in
Government Lot 5, in the East
half of the Southwest quarter
and in the West half of the
Southeast quarter of Section
19, Township 5 North, Range

intersection of the center line
of abandoned main track of
the Umatilla Branch of the
Oregon-Washington Railroad &
Navigation Company, as
formerly constructed and oper-
ated with the West line of
said Section 19, which is a
point that is 611.2 feet North,
measured along said West
line, from the Southwest
corner of said Section 19;
thence North along said West
line of Section 19, a distance of
102.9 feet, more or less, to a
point that is 100.0 feet distant
Northwesterly, measured at
right angles, from said center
line of abandoned main track;
thence Northeastly along a
straight line parallel with said
center line of abandoned main
track, and forming an angle of

approximately 76-degrees 26'
from North to Northeast with
said West line of Section 19, a
distance of 891.4 feet to the
Northwesterly corner of that
certain parcel of land con-
veyed by Union Pacific Rail-
road Company to Paul
DeMauro by deed dated July
14, 1952, U.P.L.S.D.A. 2120;
thence Southly along the
Westerly line of said deeded
parcel of land, which is a
straight line forming an angle
of 103-degrees 58' from North-
east to South with the North-
easterly extension of the last
described line, a distance of
83.5 feet to the Southwesterly
corner of said deeded parcel of
land, which is a point that is
19.0 feet distant Northwesterly,
measured at right angles,
from said center line of aban-
doned main track; thence
Northeasterly, parallel
with said center line of aban-
doned main track, and
along the Southeasterly line of

along said North line to a point
thereon that is 100.0 feet
distant Southeasterly, meas-

100.0 feet distant Southeast-
erly, measured at right
angles, from said center line
of abandoned main track to a
point on the North-South
center line of said Section 19;
thence Northerly along said
North-South center line to a
point thereon that is 50.0 feet
distant Southeasterly, meas-
ured at right angles, from said
center line of abandoned main
track; thence Southwesterly
along a straight line parallel
with said center line of aban-
doned main track, a distance
of 1433 feet, more or
less, to a point on the
Southeasterly extension of the
Northeasterly line of said
parcel of land conveyed by
deed dated July 14, 1952;
thence Southeasterly along
said Northeasterly line extend-
ed Southeasterly, a distance
of 50.0 feet to a point that is
100.0 feet distant Southeast-
erly, measured at right
angles, from said center line
of abandoned main track;
thence Southwesterly along a
straight line parallel with said
center line of abandoned main
track, a distance of 1340.37
feet, more or less, to a point
on said West line of Section 19;
thence North along said West

**How to dress for warmth
and fashion this winter**

Americans are finally getting
used to the idea that keeping
warm during long, cold winter
days and nights no longer means
turning up the thermostat. What
it has come to mean instead is
doing what people have done
through the centuries: dressing
warmly.

The fabric industry has seen a
resurgent demand for wool, the
natural fiber that is "worth
more." Slacks, jackets, skirts,
coats, scarves—even night-
wear—are being manufactured
in wool and wool blends, which
are better insulators than their
synthetic counterparts of earlier
decades.

One of the most popular looks
of the season is sweaters.
Sweaters with suits. Sweaters

The cozy, feather-filled vest
or coat that is keeping you
warm this winter will continue
to do so for many winters if
given proper care. Cost of
down-filled garments has risen,
making care of even more
importance.

Down, or feather-filled
garments, shed a few feathers
now and then. When you see
feathers protruding through
the outer covering, don't pull
them out. Instead, push them
back into the garment, if
possible. Pulling them out
enlarges the holes and can
cause more to leak out. Try to
leave space on either side of
the garment when hanging in a
closet. If pressed too tightly
between other garments, the
down tends to pack together
and warmth is reduced. Never
hang in closet wet. If the down
does get flattened, try putting
your garment in the dryer,
only if it's marked washable,
for a few minutes to fluff it up.

Down can be either washed
or dry cleaned, depending on
the kind of fabric of the outer
shell. Follow care instruc-
tions, which are usually sewn
into the jacket on the label. If
your garment is washable,
you may wash it in the
washer, and dry in the dryer.
A suggested method while
drying is placing a clean
sneaker in the dryer with the
garment. The sneaker
"beats" the down and fluffs it
up. You may want to remove
the garment from the dryer
from time to time during the
drying period, and adjust the
bunches of down which tend to
get in corners of the stitched
areas. If your coat or vest
demands dry cleaning, it is
safest to have it done profes-
sionally.
