## 'No Longer Alone' to be shown at Lexington Church

"No Longer Alone," winner of three film-industry awards, will be shown on Wednesday, Dec. 3, at the Lexington Christian Church at Lexington. The showing, open to the public free of charge, is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m.

The film, a true story, takes a close look at a woman who was searching desperately for love and acceptance, but whose cries went unheard by those who surrounded her.

Originally released by World Wide Pictures in commercial theatres, the film is now one hour in length in preparation for its eventual presentation as a television special.

"No Longer Alone" traces the life of an English actress, Joan Winmill Brown. Though she skyrocketed to fame on the British stage, her life was marked by a frantic grasp for personal fulfillment and love. Tormented by a past she was unable to forget, she succumbed to a series of nervous breakdowns; and, at one point, attempted to take her own life.

In her ultimate moment of despair, Joan was invited by a "chance" phone call to attend a Billy Graham crusade. It was here that she first discovered her worth as an individual and began her long struggle to piece her shattered life back together.

Those who have followed Billy Graham's ministry will be interested to know that Dr. Graham appears in the film in some of the footage of his 1954 London Crusade, and also in the introduction and conclusion to the film, photographed recently for this special version.

## Investiture mass in The Dalles in honor of priests

Two Mid-Columbia area priests officially were advanced to the rank of monsignor in an investiture mass at St. Peter's Catholic Church in The Dalles last Wednesday night.

Bishop Thomas J. Connolly of the Baker Diocese conferred the rites of investiture on the Rev. William Stone, pastor of St. Peter's Parish in The Dalles, and the Rev. Raymond Beard, pastor of St. Mary's Parish of Wasco. Bishop Connolly was the main concelebrant and homilist for the ceremony, which was attended by a near capacity crowd at the church.

Fourth Degree members of the Knights of Columbus provided the honor guard for the colorful ceremony, and approximately 50 priests from throughout the Baker Diocese marched in the processional and recessional portion of the mass. Also participating were at least three local ministers, the Rt. Rev. Rusty Kimsey, bishop of the Eastern Oregon Diocese for the Episcopal Church; the Rev. Charles Easley of the First Methodist Church, and the Rev. Del Anderson of Zion Lutheran Church.

The rites for Stone and Beard were the initial portion of the mass, and during the homily Bishop Connolly had words of praise for the two new monsignors, two of the four from the Baker diocese who were honored in September.

He said one of the chief reasons for the honor bestowed on Stone was his work with the schools throughout the diocese, and that Beard was being honored in part for his work on the building of a new church at Heppner.

In addition to building St. Patrick's Church, parish hall, rectory, and church parking lot, Father Beard was instrumental in building the Catholic churches in Athena and Milton-Freewater.

Father Beard served in Heppner and Ione for 16 years. The new monsignors took part in the mass as well, with Stone giving a reading from the Scriptures and Beard offering the prayers of intercession.

## Holiday requires management

The season is just ahead when many people suffer from frustrations. These days most of us are hard pressed for that precious commodity: time. Homemakers, especially, find demands for their time increased during this happy season each year. Careful planning for each day and using bits and pieces of time can make the season happier, and less stressful. The busier you are, the more important to plan. We often fail to take advantage of the bits and pieces of time that become available to us during the day. Think of these as opportunities for action, and use them productively.

In five minutes you can: call a friend and say happy holiday; make out your grocery list for a special dinner; write a thank you note; water the plants; call the Extension office and request a copy of "removing stains"; polish your shoes.

Here are suggestions from a time management specialist on how busy mothers and other time pressed people can make better use of their time: write all your appointments and important dates in a calendar, and carry it with you; schedule disagreeable jobs between agreeable ones; plan menus in advance, and buy in quantity to reduce

shopping trips; buy easy care items in clothing and home furnishings; keep food on hand "emergency shelf" that can be prepared quickly when holiday guests arrive unexpectedly.

When cooking, double recipes and freeze part for later; if watching television, do something else, like exercises, or knitting; select clothing to wear the next day...the night before. This works for kids, too. Try to get more done in the morning when you are fresher; work out a home schedule where you are doing several things at one time, such as the washing while the cake is baking, etc. If possible, work out cooperative arrangements with friends to share baby sitting, shopping, etc. Share expertise.

Homemakers need space or desk for paper work, too. Set up a filing system for your special needs and interests. Handle each piece of paper only once. Pitch the useless, file the important. Always carry a book, or some small project with you; you can do something in every precious minute you are forced to wait. Let your fingers do the walking; check catalogs and yellow pages.

Get your special gift shopping done before stores become crowded and your precious time is spent waiting. Plan some time for you; regain control of your time so you can do the things you long to do. And finally, don't waste time fretting if everything you wanted or planned to do does not get done. Chances are no one will notice. A happy relaxed hostess, or parent, is far more important than a perfectly organized household.
