Fifty Years Ago

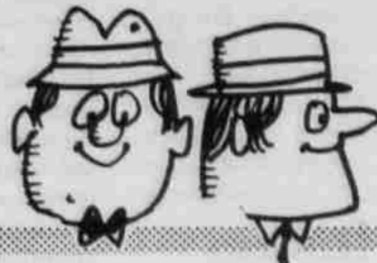

17, in Pendleton with other library people at a workshop at BMCC. Umatilla County Librarian John Switzer arranged an interesting and educational program for the school and public librarians

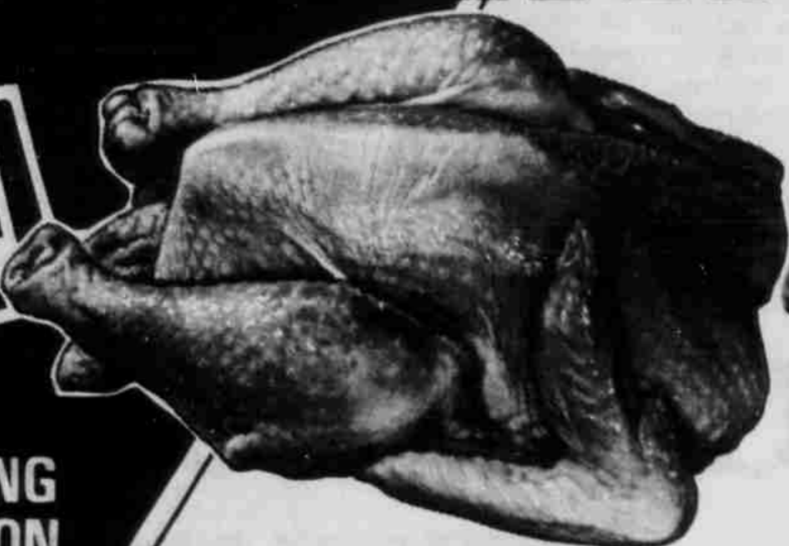

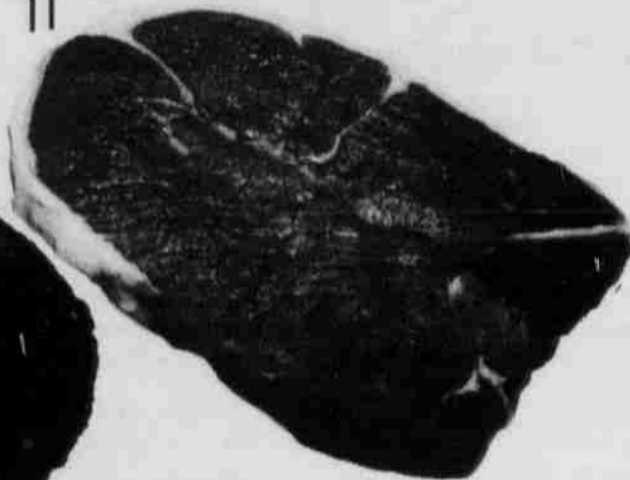
