

Employment training needs survey begins Mon. in eastern Oregon

Telephone and face-to-face interviews will begin Monday, February 16, in the 10 counties of eastern Oregon to gather information for a resource file which could lead to more job training opportunities for residents of the region.

The survey, conducted by Eastern Oregon State College Continuing Education personnel for the Oregon State Employment and Training Council, is designed to identify employment training needs of people in the area, types of training now available, agencies now offering training and agencies or businesses wishing to provide or operate training programs.

Continuing Education Director Dr. Douglas Treadway said there will be three different questionnaires, one for individuals, one for major industry representatives and one for community leaders. "We'll survey about 5,000 people altogether over the three week period," he said.

"Building this kind of file is important to the future of eastern Oregon; we hope people will cooperate," he said. "Once the information is gathered, planning for improving can really begin. We can look at what we have and

don't have and where, then we can decide what we need to better serve the industry we have and to attract the kind of industry the people of the region want."

Treadway said once the file is complete it will be put on

computer and readily accessible to employers and training agencies and be made available to those needing the information.

According to Treadway, EOOSC coordinators in eastern Oregon communities will be

conducting the survey interviews. He said phone interviews would be made between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. weekdays and weekends. He added, "We really hope people will cooperate. It's important."

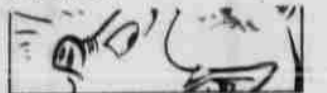
Phone book delivery to begin
