Cardinals qualify for finals in six events at state track meet

On Friday and Saturday, May 15-16, six members of the Ione track team traveled to Lewis and Clark College for the state track meet.

Parents - to - be class to begin

Instruction for expectant parents will be taught in Heppner beginning Thursday, May 21, from 7 to 9 p.m. in the Heppner Elementary School music room, according to Nancy Brownfield, Blue Mountain Community College area coordinator for south Morrow County.

The "Expectant Parents" class will include discussions of the anatomy and the physiology of pregnancy and labor. The Lamaze method of childbirth is also taught. Cost of the class is \$20 per couple and Chris Adleman is the instructor.

The eight-week course will be held on Wednesday evenings except for the initial meeting which will be Thursday.

Competing in the meet were Jim McCabe, Treve Peterson, Gregg Rietmann, Howard Leavitt, Shawn LaRue and Margaret Doherty.

Most of the preliminaries were held on Friday. The Cardinals qualified for the finals in six events. The 400-meter relay team consisting of Leavitt, McCabe, Peterson, and Rietmann qualified for the finals with a time of 45.3 which placed them first in their heat.

Gregg Rietmann finished second in the preliminaries in the 200 meters to advance him to the finals with a time of 23.6. Rietmann also ran the 100 in 11.7 but did not qualify for the

finals. The 1600-meter relay team consisting of McCabe, Peterson, Leavitt and Rietmann, finished first in their heat in 3:34.2 to advance them to the finals on Saturday.

Margaret Doherty advanced to the finals in the 400 meters with a first place in a time of 1:00.5. Doherty also qualified in the 200 in 27.3 which placed her second in her heat.

On Saturday Shawn LaRue threw a personal best of 148 feet, 10 inches in the javelin. The 400-meter relay team placed fifth in the finals with a time of 45.4.

McCabe had a personal best and a school record in the finals of the 400 meters with a time of 51.9. Rietmann placed fifth in the 200 meters with a time of 23.5.

The 1600-meter relay team brought the Cardinal spectators to their feet as they challenged the defending state

champions, St. Mary's for first place. The Cardinals were edged by St. Mary's but had an outstanding time of 3:30.9 for second place and a new school record.

Margaret Doherty finished fourth in the 400 meters in a time of 1:00.1, and fifth in the 200 with a time of 27.1.

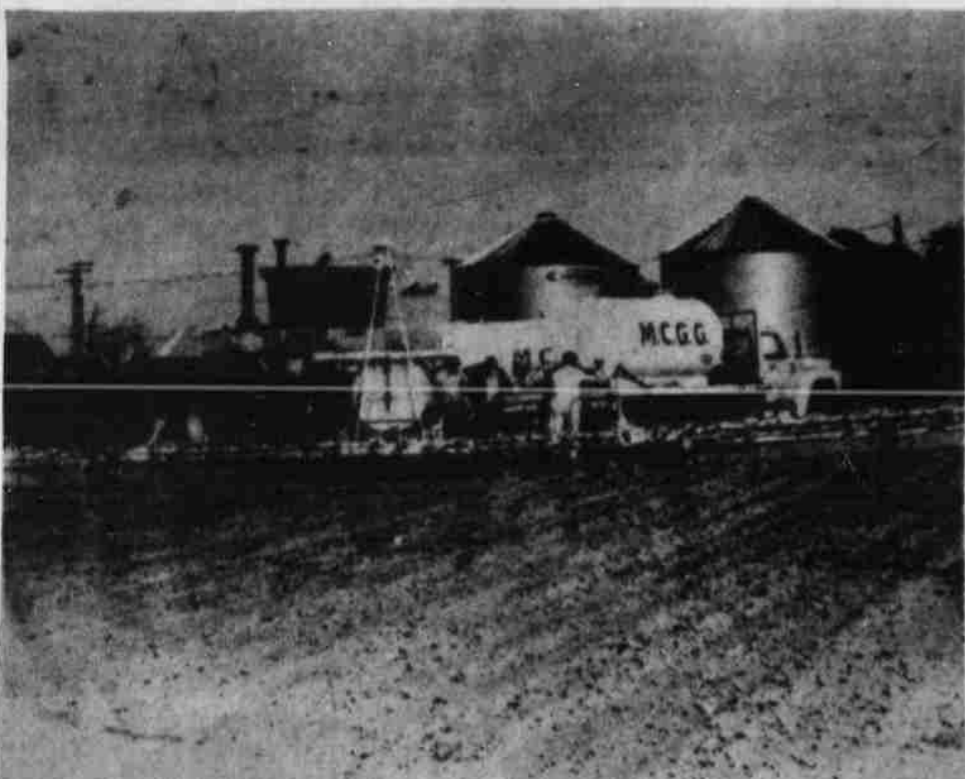
