THEY and NOW

From water clocks to diving watches, man's attempts to keep time through the ages have often been linked to water, the earth's natural timekeeper. Historians have discovered that:



THEN: Water clocks were probably the first timekeepers with moving parts. Time was measured by how much water was lost from the clock. The Greeks called them clepsydras (water-stealers) and built what is believed to be the world's largest water clock in Athens to standardize the city's time. Named the Tower of the Winds, it still stands today.

Welfare reform not in spotlight

Welfare reform hasn't occupied much of the public spotlight this session, but it surely is one of state government's major achievements of the past two years, reported Senator Ken Jernstedt. An aggressive top-to-bottom shakeup of welfare programs waged by the Atiyeh administration has replaced welfare with work for thousands of Oregonians at a savings of more than \$150 million in your federal and state tax dollars, and has provided a blueprint for the rest of the nation to follow, because what has happened with little fanfare here in Oregon is what the Reagan administration hopes to achieve in all states.

No one can quarrel with the original concept of welfare, which was designed during the 1930's as a system of temporary aid for people who, through no fault of their own, were unable to meet their needs and the needs of their families. But somehow, without our quite knowing how it happened, this system of temporary aid has turned into a system of lasting shackles—and it has reached the point where we now have third and fourth generation welfare families.

What to do to solve this problem and to break this chain of dependency has been with the State Legislature for a number of years, but reform attempts have generally been frustrated by the federal government, which provides much of the money and most of the say, commented Jernstedt. Oregon's policy has resulted in 5,000 recipients being immediately dropped from the welfare rolls, with another 15,000 receiving a sharp reduction in their payments. It is estimated that nearly 75 percent of those who were affected by these changes are now employed and no longer dependent on help from their fellow citizens.

Nothing in these new policies in any way alters or dilutes our collective responsibility to help those with legitimate needs, starting with the blind, aged and disabled. We should continue to demonstrate our compassion, but while doing so, we must guarantee that our limited resources are not squandered by those whose greed exceeds their need, said Jernstedt.
