- All jars must be clean and labeled (exhibitor is responsible for filling out own labels). Unlabeled jars will be disqualified.
- Labels are to contain contents of jar, method and length of processing and date. Jams and jellies are to be labeled with name and date only.
- The judge reserves the right to open all jars.
- All vegetables and meats must be pressure canned.

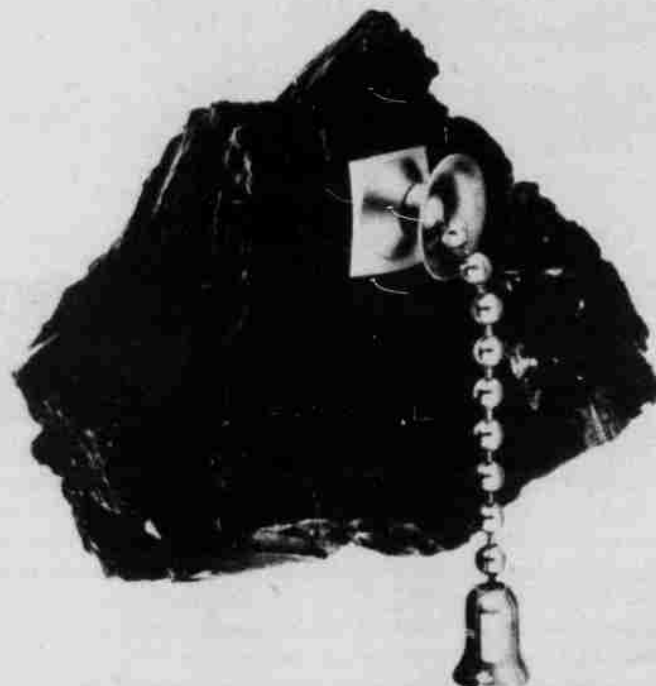
