Wheat growers will have the opportunity to learn about the results of recent research on dryland wheat production and other timely topics at the Columbia Basin Agricultural Research Center Field Days,

says Bob Costa, Morrow County Extension agent. All interested persons are invited to attend the Field Days at the Pendleton Station on June 24 and at the Sherman Station at Moro on June 25.

The Field Day session at the Pendleton Station, nine miles north of Pendleton, will begin

at 8:30 a.m. and adjourn at 4 p.m. Some of the topics on the program are Water Conservation in Wheat-Fallow Agriculture, Spring Grains, Small Grain Variety Trials, Methods of Herbicide Incorporation, Chemical Control of Cercospora Foot Rot, No-Till Seeding and Fertility, and a

legislative update. The program will include many well known agricultural scientists, as well as State Representative Bob Harper.

The Field Day session at the Sherman Station at Moro will begin at 1:30 p.m. and will adjourn at 4 p.m. Topics on the program include Incorpora-

tion Techniques for Cheatgrass Control, Testing of Cereal Varieties Available to Dryland Farmers in Eastern Oregon, Modified Tillage Practices, Cereal Varieties for the Coming Years, and a legislative update. The program will include many well

known agricultural scientists including the highly honored cereal breeder Warren Kronstad, as well as State Representative Bill Bellamy.
