Former Heppner man appointed rep to Mortgage Bancorporation

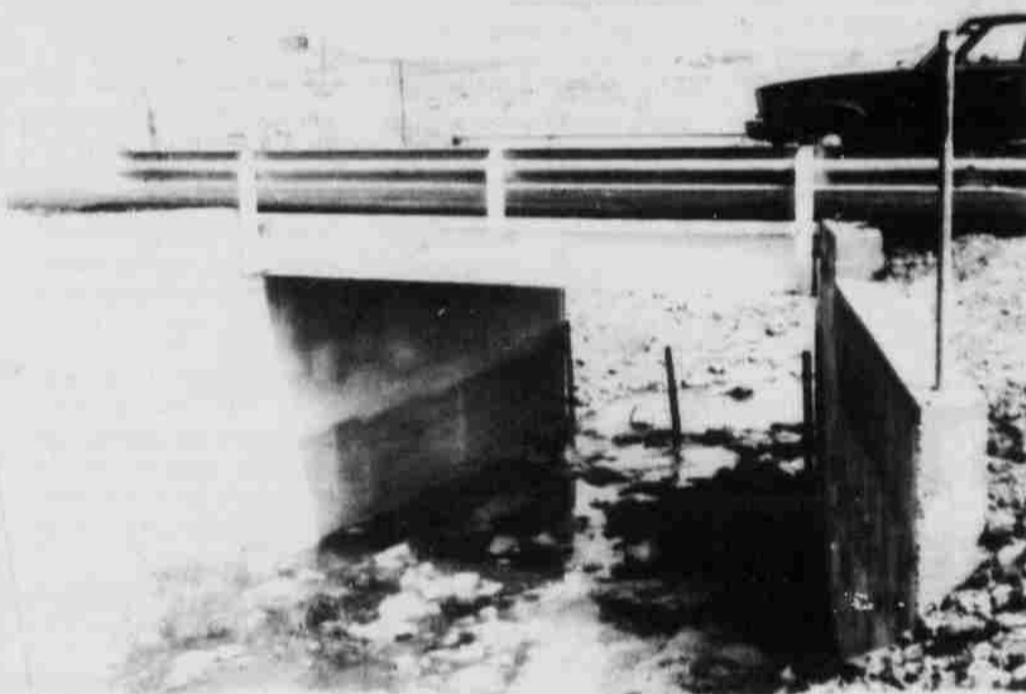
Anna Johnson has returned home from a five-week visit in Rauland and Oslo Norway, and Gothenburg and Stockholm Sweden where she was visiting relatives.

Bert Peck Bridge construction completed

The county road crew has recently completed the reconstruction of the bridge located on Bert Peck Road south of Lexington. The old structure, which was constructed approximately 25 years ago, collapsed recently due to the deterioration of the timber substructure.

The new 26-foot bridge is constructed with steel stringers setting on reinforced concrete abutments. Steel decking with a premixed asphalt overlay was used for the roadway, and a standard corrugated steel guardrail for

the safety rail.

This bridge was constructed over a period of two months at the cost of \$15,395 which, says the Public Works Dept., in-

cluded \$5,560 for labor, \$7,048 for material and \$2,787 for equipment.

"This all steel and concrete structure is designed to carry

all legal loads and because of the types of materials used in construction it will last for many years," said a Public Works Dept. spokesperson.
