

## Farm program covers weather-damaged crops

Judy Buschke, Executive Director of the Morrow County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office, says farmers who accurately reported crop

acres and signed an application for payment will be eligible to receive disaster benefits of their 1981 crops along with price support benefits and deficiency pay-

ments.

The 1981 program provides for disaster payments to help farmers whose crops are severely damaged by weather conditions. The program

offers crop protection against drought, flood, hail, windstorms, insect infestation, plant disease or any other type of disaster which occurs through no fault of the farmer.

"Morrow County farmers should notify our office if they expect low yields on their wheat or barley crops because of severe weather conditions," she said.

Under the program, a wheat

and feed grain farmer whose crop yield is less than 60 percent of the established yield, times the acreage planted for harvest may receive disaster payments on the production losses below 60

percent. Farmers will also be eligible for disaster payments if they are prevented from planting a program crop for harvest because of a natural disaster. However, the planting of other later non-conserv-

ing crops must also have been prevented.

The ASCS official said farmers should notify his office before they harvest or destroy crops or replant other crops when a disaster strikes. Accurate crop acreage and production reports are necessary to assure full program benefits, she said.

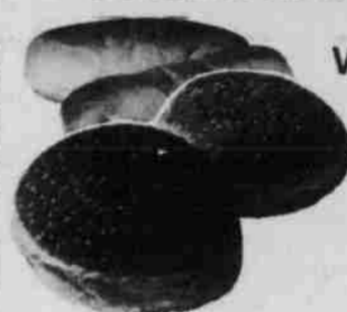

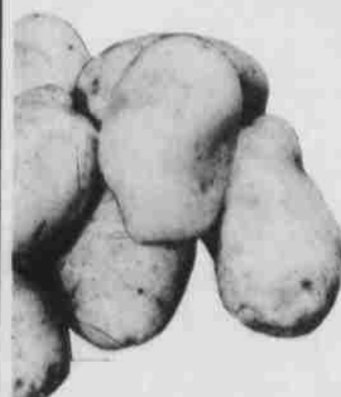
